A vote for the road bonds will be a boost to get Oregon out of the mud.

Faithful old "Dobbin" is too slow these days, even for the funeral procession, such being our haste to get the dead laid away and return to the mad rush for money making among the living.

It seems hardly necessary to tell the Germans to go to grass for they appear to have reached that stage already. A German agricultural expert is quoted as having informed the people that dainty dishes for human consumption may be made from red clover and alfalfa. He might also have recommended rock soup as an inexpensive dish.

United States Senator Harry Lane died at a hospital in San Francisco Wednesday night. He broke down in health several weeks ago and was on his way home to take a complete rest. Appointment to fill the vacancy occasioned by his death will be made by Governor Withycombe and lightning rods are already up by aspirants for the place.

The coming of the State Sunday School Convention to Newberg last week was a great treat and those who failed to hear the noted speakers, such as Marion Lawrence, missed a great opportunity for hearing something worth while. It costs a town something to entertain a convention of this size but it is worth all it costs to have people of this class come into a community for a few days. Apparently the delegates were well pleased, for some were heard to make favorable comments on the arrangements made for the convention.

The sentiment of Californians with reference to voting bonds for hard surface road building was well expressed at the last election held in that state. A few years ago when an \$18,000,000 road bonding issue was submitted to the people it only carried by a small majority, the vote being 93,000 for the measure and 80,000 against it. At the last election when a vote was taken on a \$15,000,000 bonding proposition for further road building the vote was 542,000 for it and 137,000 against it, every county in the state being carried in favor of the bonds. In the interval between the two elections held, hard surface roads had been built and the voters were so well pleased with the results obtained that they wanted more money to expend in the same way. Washington on the north of us has enlisted in the war on bad roads in earnest and it is now up to Oregon to fall in or remain in the mud and be distanced in the race. A Newberg business man says that on a trip he made to Seattle a short time ago he met a friend who said he liked Oregon in many ways and wanted to locate in the Willamette valley but that with the roads as they now are he would not make the change. This is one of our handicaps and we now have an opportunity for taking the initial step for its removal. Vote for the road bonds.

To the Voters of Yamhill County
The undersigned, citizens of Yamhill County, after critically and conscientiously studying the measure, are deeply interested in the enactment of the STATE ROAD BOND ISSUE AND HIGHWAY BILL on June 4th, appearing on the ballot as No 314. We ask our friends everywhere to support the bill in the interest of better roads, of which we are in much need. We believe it the best oppor-

tunity to get good roads that the state has ever had. It is a constructive measure which will pay out WITH OUT ADDING EXTRA TAX BURDENS THROUGH GENERAL TAXATION. WE HAVE HEARD OF NO BETTER METHOD TO BUILD ROADS. THE AUTOMOBILE TAX AND THE QUARTER MILL STATE TAX WILL PAY THE BONDS WITHIN THE TIME SPECIFIED. The quarter mill levy will realize \$200,000 per annum; the 1918 automobile license fees, according to the estimate of the Secretary of State, will realize \$478,341, net, or total \$678,341 per annum. The automobile increase has shown to be better than 33 1-3 per cent per annum. IF THE BILL CARRIES WE GET FEDERAL AID; IF IT LOSES, WE PAY THE SAME TAXES AND CONTINUE TO TRAVEL THE roads as in years past, WITH NO PERMANENT SYSTEM OF IMPROVEMENT. EVERY STATE BORDERING OREGON HAS BETTER ROADS THAN WE. They secured them by methods similar to the one proposed in Oregon. They have voted bonds more than once and would not now give up their good roads for more than they cost. They are watching the election in Oregon, whether she will show enough enterprise to follow her neighbor's example and increase her population and prosperity. Should Oregon do so, many are ready to invest in Oregon, realizing that Oregon has advantages superior to theirs. We have confidence in our legislature and the Highway Commission, and we respectfully ask the citizens of the entire state to go to the polls on June 4th and VOTE FOR THE BONDS (314 YES) firm in the conviction that YOU WILL NEVER REGRET IT, BUT on the contrary YOU WILL WONDER IN future years WHY THE STATE DID NOT TAKE SUCH ACTION LONG BEFORE. Study the bill, it is convincing. If this bill becomes a law the present automobile tax cannot be repudiated until the bonds are redeemed. Forty per cent of the entire levy for road purposes, now used to maintain the main highways in this county, will be released, for the maintenance of the side roads.

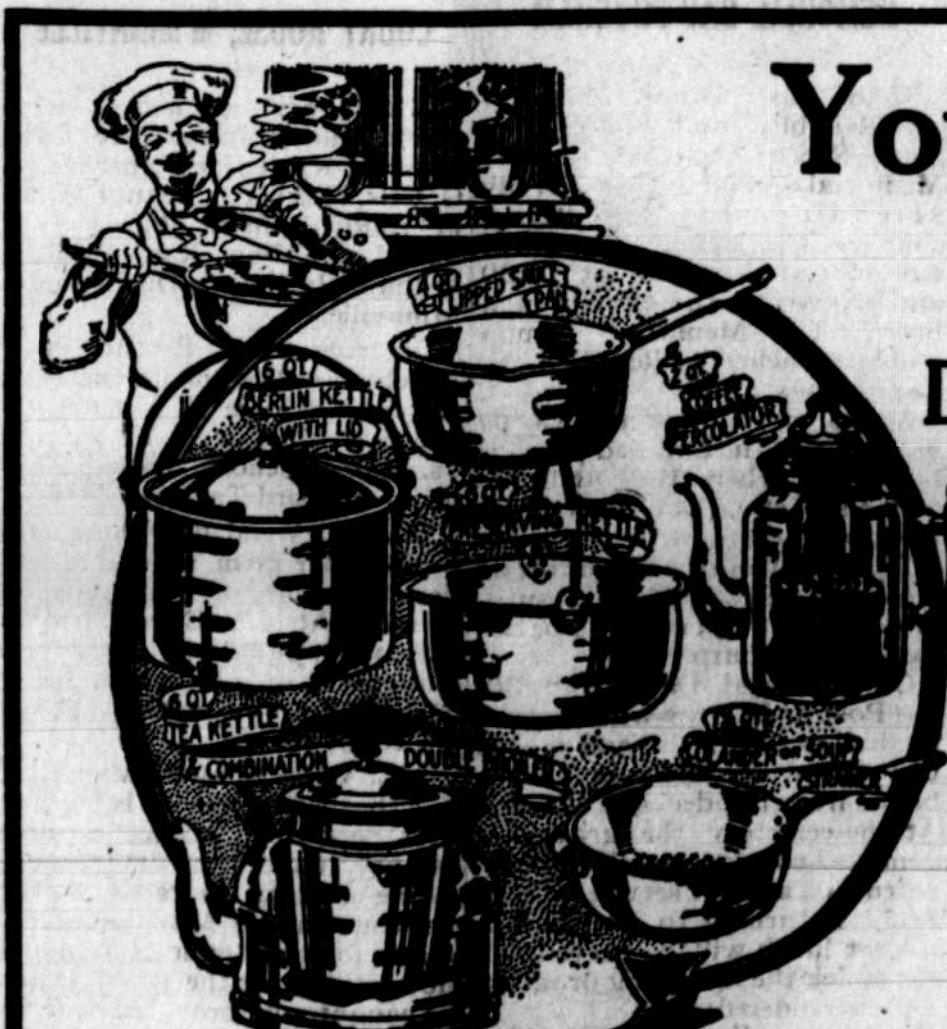
