FARM NOTES BY COUNTY AGENT

From the food preparedness survey taken on Food Defense Day some important facts that will be of value in food preparedness work were ascertained. The labor situation was found to be in better shape than was anticipated, only 12 farmers reported as being in need of help at once. The names of these have been sent to the public employment bureau at Portland.

The labor needs at harvest time will be far more serious. Ninety-one farmers expressed their needs in the form of harvest hands, threshing help, berry pickers and prune pickers. A total of 729 people are needed to supply this demand. Much of this help can be supplied from within the county and steps will be taken at once to provide it.

Thirty-one farmers stated that they are in need of seed of different kinds to complete their spring planting and 35 other farmers have seed for sale. A list of the names of the latter with the kind of seed and prices has been sent to each of those who are in need of seed. Oats seem to be quite plentiful and the supply of potatoes seems to be adequate.

The greatest increase in acreage to be planted this year is that of beans which will be over five times that of normal years. Corn and potatoes indicate an increase of 86 per cent each. Among the livestock the only appreciable decrease is that of stock hogs, which show a decrease of 21 per cent. While the supply of available pork has decreased, Yamhill county farmers have
