



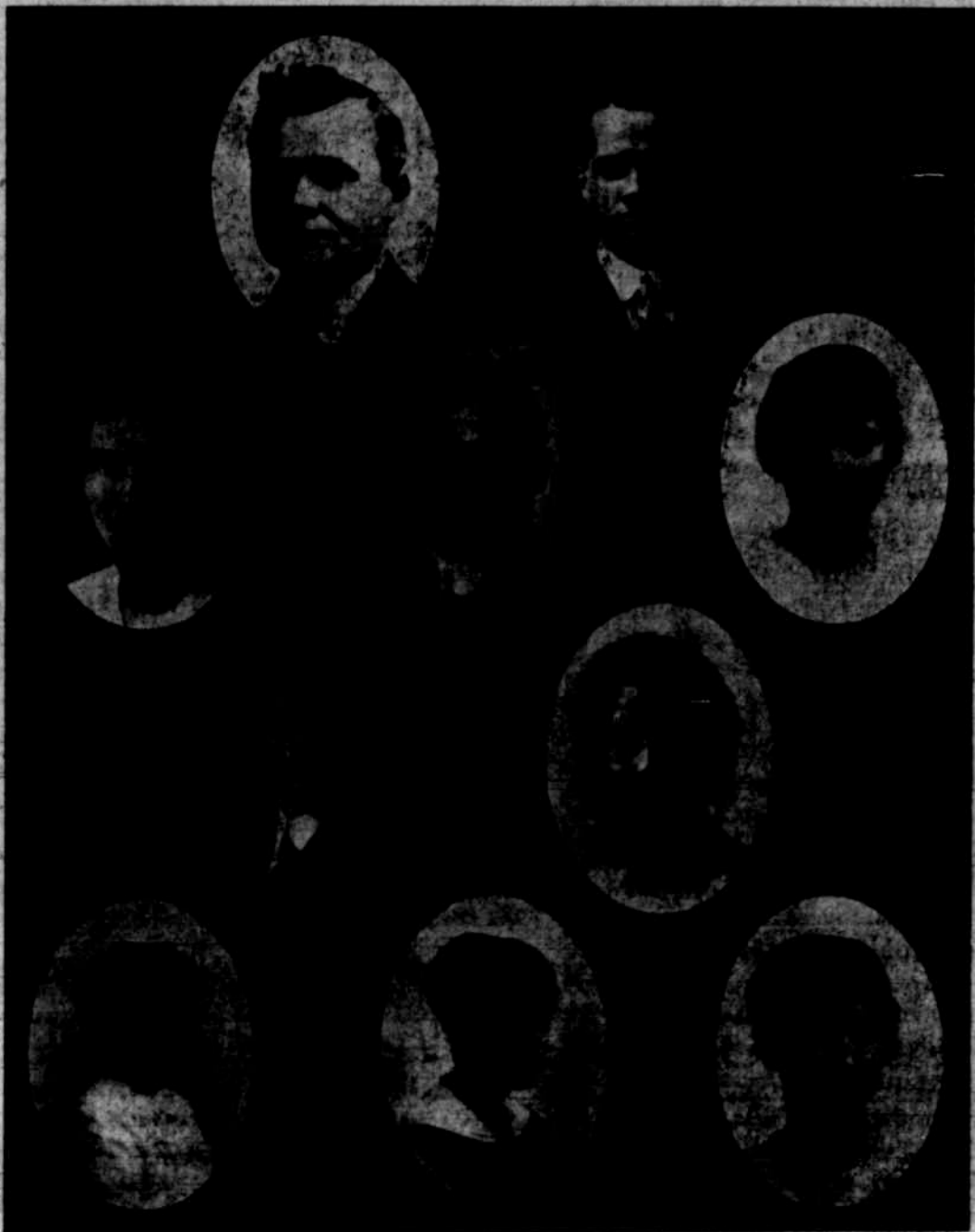

STATE ROAD BOND MEASURE PULLS THROUGH BY OVER 20000 MAJORITY

The Graphic is highly gratified to be able to announce that the road bonds have carried in the state by a majority of about 20,000.

It is a great victory for the good roads program and Yamhill county will come in for a very liberal share in the distribution of the funds.

On Wednesday our county court sent the following communication to S. Benson, chairman of the State Highway Commission:

"Yamhill County Court has this day made order as follows: 'In the matter of preparing road bed for hard surfacing in Yamhill county in accordance with the provisions and requirements of House Bill five hundred fifty, recently adopted by the people of Oregon.

"Be it Resolved, That the County Court of Yamhill county declare its willingness and intention to prepare ten or fifteen miles of road bed in accordance with the provisions of the law above referred to, and earnestly request that the Highway Commission take steps to pave the same during the year nineteen seventeen.

Uniform tax classification amendment, yes 2056; no 1959. Requiring election of city, town and state officers at same time, yes 2858; no 1403.

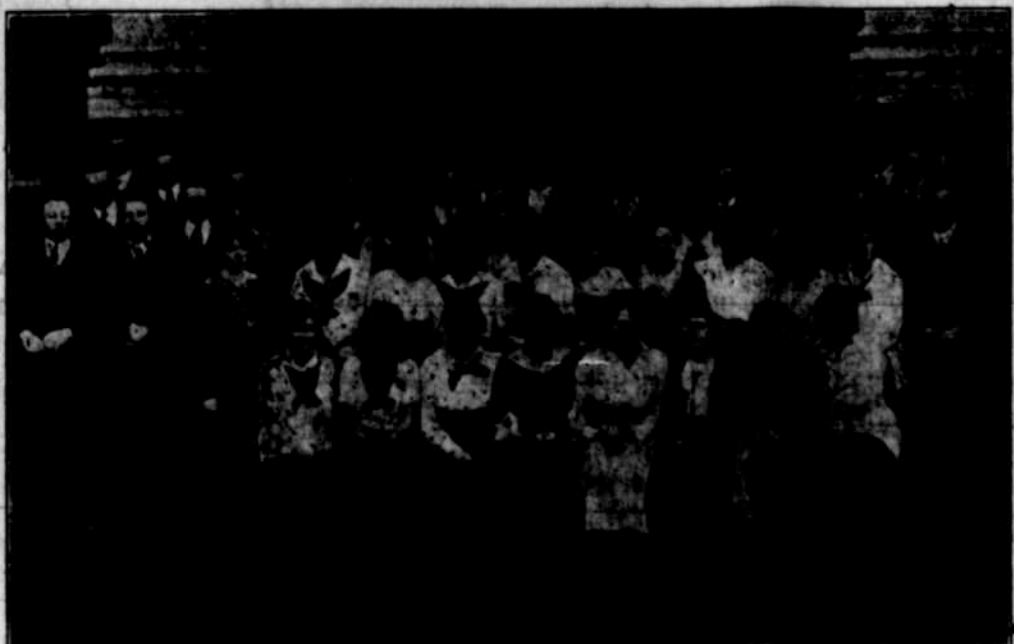
Four hundred thousand dollar tax levy for a new penitentiary, yes 1372; no 3140.
