The local mill of the Chas. K. Spaulding Logging Company last month made what proved to be the record month's run since 1912, the output being in excess of 2,400,000 feet of lumber. This is considered an exceptionally good output, considering the fact that the force was handicapped somewhat from the labor and car shortage. The latter is considerably improved and the labor problem will no doubt soon be adjusted as the company is now paying on a basis of \$2.50 a day for common labor, with skilled worker's wages proportionately higher.
