Monday about forty business men who are backing the Chautauqua took luncheon at the Imperial hotel. Glen McAddam, the advance man for the Ellison-White bureau, was in attendance and gave a talk outlining the course to be given here and making many timely suggestions regarding the work, including the advertising and sale of tickets. Dr. Rankin was elected chairman, Attorney C. R. Chapin secretary, and S. L. Parrett, treasurer. As a committee on advertising E. R. Gatchell, S. S. Dow and E. H. Woodward were appointed. C. J. Hoskins was made chairman of a committee on the sale of tickets and S. P. Timberlake chairman of the committee on grounds. Others will be added to these two committees later. The Chautauqua will be held in a tent furnished by the bureau and it is practically settled that it will be erected on the public school grounds where water and public comfort facilities will be convenient.

While working at the cemetery a short time ago Frank Jones made as careful a count as he could of the number of graves and he has furnished the Graphic with the following figures: In the section held by the Brutscher school district, 104; the G. A. R. section, 114; Friends, 505; making a total of 723. The first burial was made in the early part of the year 1880, the deceased being the mother of J. R. Smith, now living in Newberg. The second was that of Thomas Mackie who was a nephew of Wm. Clemmens, and the third was that of John Green, a man who came out from Kansas and was living at Dayton at the time of his death. The writer assisted in the care of Mr. Green during his sickness and at the burial. This was late in the season of 1880. In company with Jesse Edwards, who furnished the team, the box for the grave was brought down from Dayton and with the wilderness of heavy timber and thick undergrowth in the midst of which just a little sunlight had been let in by the woodsman's ax, it looked like a lonely spot in which to lay the dead. And could those who in the present day are inclined to criticize the seeming lack of uniformity in the arrangements of the first section of the cemetery see that spot as it appeared then, they would understand and withhold adverse criticism.
