Never was seen a happier community than Dundee is over the result of the Red Cross drive. To many it seems like a personal gift to our boys from Dundee who have been willing to answer the call for men to uphold the standard of democracy and freedom for all humanity, and, if need comes, the same Dundee spirit will be manifest in other ways in the future.

On account of the extra garden space planted this year and the need of its cultivation many who wanted to attend were not present, but even so there was a large attendance. Then followed the picnic dinner, and such a dinner, every one satisfying the usual picnic appetite and still enough food for many more. In the afternoon the Dundee band favored the assembly with several selections, the primary children gave a little fairyland play and Prof. Powell gave out the music diplomas. Then County Superintendent Duncan gave the eighth grade certificates to a class of eleven and made one of the best addresses ever heard in Dundee. Prof. Anderson, who is to be the principal of our school next year, made a few remarks and Miss Nellie F. McNeill, our principal who is leaving us, said a few words of appreciation for the co-operation she has had during the five years she has been with us. A tennis tournament completed the program for the day.

Our community Hall was beautifully decorated on Saturday by the high school children with blue and white, which were the class colors, roses, and the class motto, "Character the only true test of education." A large audience enjoyed every feature of the graduation program. The scholarly, practical address given by Supt. Churchill went home to each heart. Of course as usual our girls were the sweetest ever, the boys fine and manly and the chorus led by Prof. Powell Oregon's best. The six graduates, who at the close made a beautiful picture as they received the flowers that almost smothered them, were Selma Holzmeyer, Mabel Swink, Gladys Edwards, Frances Eddens, Oscar Jensen and Arthur Livengood. Gladys Edwards as first honor pupil received a scholarship, her choice of any one of five of our Oregon institutions of learning, including Reed College. Frances Eddens won second honors and Selma Holzmeyer received the scholarship to Willamette University. Following is the program:
