This is sure the hottest hole of a place I ever struck. It has been 102 degrees in the shade. The wind is like waves of heat coming off of a hot stove and it sure does get up and blow, taking the sand with it. Makes it nice when we are eating outside. We have our

light uniforms and hats now but still they are much warmer than civilian clothes. How are the cherries? Suppose they are a thing of the past now. No, I have not even seen a strawberry, let alone have any to eat. * * * Suppose you are planning for a big Fourth. They are intending to have a grand time here, are expecting 50,000 visitors. Wish you folks were to be among them. This is a large army post—Vancouver is just a little spot beside this. All the old buildings are of stone with a nice grove of trees in front of them. I have not seen but a few of the barracks yet and have been around quite a little. So they are working for the Y. M. C. A. there, are they? The Y. M. C. A. is doing a great work for the army. They have a large building here and another in the new part. * * * I have not received any papers yet. If you did not give the troop and cavalry number they will come in general delivery and I don't go up there very often. So no other Chehalem Center boys have decided to enlist yet. Don't think of any more to write. Will close. Am well, hoping you folks are well. Good-bye, Carlos Johnson, Fort Riley, Kansas. B Troop, 20th Cavalry.
