ABOUT THE DRAFT BY THE COUNTY CLERK

Editor Graphic:

Owing to the anxiety of the public in regard to the army draft, I thought it would probably be of considerable interest if I give you the information I have at hand, in regard to the matter. From the vast number of inquiries I have been receiving in regard to the drawing at Washington, last Friday, I think the public as a rule are of the wrong opinion in regard to some of the most important matters in regard to the drawing. In the first place every man in the United States who had registered was drawn, so the only thing for each person to be anxious about now is in what relative position his name will appear in the list which applies to Yamhill county. Our county was very fortunate, as she had more volunteers than her quota required in the first call, therefore, there will be no one required to appear before the local exemption board at this time. However, if there is another call soon, which seems very probable, Yamhill county will be called upon to supply her quota, then the men called will be the first ones that were drawn at Washington. For instance if in the next call Yamhill county has to furnish 100 men, then the numbers 1 to 100 inclusive will be required to appear before the local board for examination. It will probably be the first of August before the exemption board will have the official list compiled and be able to give each one his relative position in the list of 1466 names, which is the complete registration for this county. Anyone that will write, C. B. Wilson, the county clerk, and enclose the number of his blue card, also the number of his precinct—both of these numbers are given on the blue card you received the day you registered—and enclose a self-addressed envelope, will receive their number, which indicates the relative position, in the list for Yamhill county. Owing to the extra amount of work in the county clerk's office, it will be necessary for you to comply with the above request. C. B. Wilson, County Clerk
