CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission announces two open competitive examinations to be held in Newberg on November 2nd and 3rd.

The first is for clerks with knowledge of stenography or typewriting in the Departmental Service at Washington, D. C., with entrance salaries ranging from \$900 to \$1,200 a year.

The second is for Forest and Field Clerk. The entrance salary for Forest Clerk is from \$1,100 to \$1,200 a year, for Field Clerk up to \$125 a month.

For information concerning the examinations inquire at the local post office or apply for Form 304 (application blank) and Form 1424 (information for applicants) for the examination for clerks with knowledge of stenography or typewriting, or Form 1371 (application blank) and Form 1424 for the forest and field clerk examination.
