WORTHAM SHOWS COMING TO NEWBERG NEXT WEEK

The great Wortham shows will exhibit in Newberg three days, starting Monday night, October 22. This is one of the largest carnival organizations on the road, having its own private stateroom cars for its people and its own flat and baggage cars for the show equipment. There are 15 paid attractions and about 20 concessions. They have a merry-go-round, an Eli Ferris wheel, a big pit or side show, etc., but besides these they also have "The Whip," that wonderful riding device that all fun-lovers in the east go crazy about.

Then there is the "monkey speed-way," that wonderful race track, where real live monkeys vie with each other in seeing who can go the fastest in their miniature automobiles.

Then there are the Arabian nights, bluey bluey, the hippodrome or big animal show, and many more.

It is sufficient to tell the Newberg amusement goer that there are a lot of good attractions, two good bands that will discourse plenty of that lively music that circus bands are noted for.

Particularly in the 15 shows is a huge motor or Silodrome with sensational events that thrill the very soul of the spectator.

Dare devil speed demons mount the wall of the cave of death and

perform seemingly impossible feats, distinctly different, and a hundred times more dangerous than ever before seen in dromes.

The program includes Jack Simpson, of El Paso, who wins instant favor with his performances while moving at the rate of 70 to 80 miles an hour on a motorcycle, while Joe Reese, of Spokane, eclipses all dirt track exhibitions on the perpendicular walls of the Silodrome. As a fitting climax the two riders mount the walls and there race for life, passing and repassing each other at a speed that seems impossible.

This is the most thrilling and sensational riding ever attempted.
