COUNTY AGENTS ADVICE PROVES PROFITABLE

The man who starved his horse to death on sawdust went at it all wrong. He ought to have put the sawdust in the silo. On account of the shortage of feed last fall farmers baled much of their straw and many of them sought the advice of the county agent as to the best method of feeding straw. Some farmers who had silos and not enough corn to fill them were told to mix straw with green corn. B. F. Smith, who lives on the John Pennington place south of town, followed the county agent's advice and mixed seven loads of straw with 35 tons of green corn. Mr. Smith is now feeding 12 cows and some young stock on this silage with some hay and no grain. He says he has the best silage in the county with no waste. His cows having never had silage before were expected to go slow on eating this Hoover ration, but Mr. Smith says not a single bite was left. Mr. Smith is so enthused over his success that he says he is going to build another silo next year. Telephone-Register.

RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the county of Yamhill, Oregon, to be held at Newberg on January 12, 1918, to fill the position of rural carrier at Newberg, Oregon, and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above-mentioned county. The examination will

be open only to male citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. This form and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.

THE WAR SAVING PLAN IN A NUT SHELL

The Government's War Saving Plan, is a plan by which you can lend small savings to your government at four per cent interest compounded quarterly.

You lend to your Government by the purchase of war savings certificates and thrift stamps.

A war savings certificate costs \$4.12, if purchased this month

or next—the cost to advance one cent each succeeding month during 1918. On January 1, 1923, the certificate will mature and the Government will pay you \$5 for it.

A thrift stamp is a stamp costing 25 cents to be applied in payment for a war savings certificate. It does not earn interest, its purpose being to help purchasers accumulate in 25 cent pieces, the amount necessary to pay for a war savings certificate.

War savings certificates and thrift stamps can be purchased at your post office, from your city or rural mail carrier, at your city banks, and from your merchants and other authorized agents.

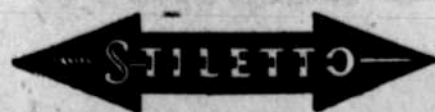
