For the average person who does inside work meatless days will work no hardship. In fact, the most of us who are in this class will fare just as well if we observe four or five meatless days in the week.

Possibly the county court had heard of the petition of six hundred or more persons asking for an appropriation for maintaining a county agent, when they ruled that no decisions would be reached at the budget meeting by taking a vote of those in attendance.

The Graphic believes that M. S. Shrock, as county agent, earned for the county a good deal more than his salary during the past two years, and consequently we feel that the county court erred in turning down the petition of more than 600 people who asked that an agent be employed the coming year. While department officials are loading the mails with printed matter urging the people to conserve the resources of the country all down the line, it occurs to the Graphic that these same officials could very profitably practice what they are handing out, in the matter of the saving of paper. For instance, there came to this office on Wednesday a communication from the Committee on Public Information at Washington which was enclosed in an extra heavy manila envelope 9 1/2 x 12 inches, all at a cost of at least double the amount almost any private concern would have expended for a like purpose. One of these envelopes was doubtless mailed to each and every newspaper in the United States. This is only one instance of needless extravagance shown by department heads in getting their appeals to the people. Many others might be named. Apparently they forget that the people must pay for the paper they waste. It is the other fellow who must do the conserving.

That tastes widely differ in audiences regarding what it takes to make an enjoyable entertainment, is clearly evidenced by the various and sundry expressions heard with reference to the Venetians who gave the third number of the lyceum course Thursday night of last week. Some say they enjoyed the violinist but cared little for the rest of the program; others that they greatly appreciated the violin

and accordion playing, that they enjoyed hearing the soloist fairly well but cared little for the reader; some think the selections were too commonplace, not enough classic music given; still others have suggested that the conservation idea was followed too closely by the ladies in the selection of their stage apparel. These are some of the expressions heard, but to be fair to the Venetians we must say that if hearty applause is to be taken as a criterion, nearly everybody thoroughly enjoyed the violinist and accordion artist and other numbers pleased many. In fact many say they think it was the most enjoyable lyceum program given here for some time, so there you are. Verily, it is difficult to please all the people all the time.

DEATH OF SAMUEL JACKSON

Samuel W. Jackson died at his home in Newberg at the corner of Sherman and Blaine streets at 12:45 p. m. Tuesday, January 8, after a brief illness resulting from hardening of the arteries.

He was born in Fulton county, Illinois, March 2, 1842, being at the time of his death aged 75 years, 10 months and 6 days.

In 1867 he was married to Corlita McIntyre and to this union were born three daughters and two sons. The daughters survive him and were at his bedside when death claimed him. They are, Mrs. E. J. Mahr, of Corvallis, Mrs. B. Trueblood Smith, of Moro, and Miss Leona Jackson, of Newberg. The two sons died before arriving at maturity.

In 1890 Mr. Jackson with his family moved from Illinois to Oregon where he has since resided, most of his residence in this state being in Corvallis where the funeral services will be held on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

FLAVOR EASILY AFFECTED

The age of the egg has a very marked effect upon its flavor, as germs enter through the porous shell and start a process of decomposition. The flavor of fresh eggs varies with the food of the hen. If the hen eats a large amount of animal food the eggs will have a stronger, coarser flavor than when the hens are fed chiefly upon grains. Strong-flavored vegetables, such as onions, affect the taste of the eggs in a very marked degree. Another very important point in securing eggs of good flavor is to keep them in a clean place, away from strong smelling substances. The shell of the egg is porous and readily absorbs odors. If there is musty straw in the hens' nests the eggs will be pretty sure to have a bad flavor.—Petaluma Poultry Journal.

DETROIT TO CHICAGO BY MAXWELL TRUCKS

Economical measures were recently adopted to supply the demand for trucks and passenger cars when the Maxwell company executed a novel drive-away of fifty trucks loaded with fifty passenger cars. The fifty loaded trucks were driven to Chicago.

Freight congestion was greatest just before Christmas when it became necessary to make a quick delivery in Chicago of fifty trucks and fifty passenger cars.

Some plan had to be evolved immediately—and it was. Fifty sturdy Maxwell one-ton trucks were prepared with proper blockings to carry passenger cars.

By not allowing an empty truck to leave the great Oakland Avenue plant the Maxwell company gave a splendid demonstration of how economy in transportation may be accomplished. The overland truck train released a train of thirty freight cars for other transportation services.

Care was taken to provide against any load-shifting and, after dark last Friday night, the trucks took up their trail to the Windy City. The train was piloted by Ray McNamara, the famous Maxwell road engineer. A large portion of the drive was over snow and ice covered roads.

The last lap of the truck train was from Coldwater to Chicago in one day, a distance of 167 miles. The train moved out of Coldwater in two sections—25 trucks to a section.

McNamara reports a remarkably successful trip, with some of the fifty drivers inexperienced.

ARMY MEALS COOKED IN AIR

Food for Italians in Alpine Fighting is Heated En Route on the Thermos Principle.

The most novel commissary in the war is that employed by the Italians in the Alpine fighting against the invaders. The kitchens are oftentimes 1,200 feet below the men, writes an Italian correspondent, yet the soldiers get their meals steaming hot.

Aerial tramways are the only thing that makes the brilliant defense of the Italians possible, for without warm food and drink constantly arriving they would be unable to withstand the cold in their high posts where they command vital passes and hold the invaders back.

It is impossible for the troops on these high ledges to have fires, lack of space and secrecy making a stove or smoke impractical. The cooking therefore is begun far below in kitchens, finished in thermos bottles and fireless cookers that bear the food aloft.

Huge cuts of meat and thick vegetable stews are placed over roaring fires down at the timber line where there is fuel in plenty and then before finished put into vessels which apply the thermos principle so that by the time they have reached their destination high overhead they will be cooked through and palatable.

WIRELESS PHOTOGRAPHS.
