Frank Jones was showing some pictures in town, Monday morning, of a big land slide that took place on the line between his farm and his brother Lee's some days ago, when about a quarter of an acre changed positions, taking trees and everything else it contained with it and also changing the course of a good sized stream of water that passed through it. With the same logic advanced by the old Hoosier farmer who told his friends that the wind storm of the previous night was the hardest ever, for it blew down oak trees in his pasture that had never been blown down before, it is easy to figure that the rains of the past month have not been equaled since the discovery of Mount Hood, for Frank says he is sure this is the first such movement mother earth has made on his farm in that time, judging from the growth of trees.

Later in the season he says he will increase his force of men and thinks he will have no difficulty in getting all the men he will need as the class of fellows who work at wood cutting are past the war age. He expects to get something like 20,000 cords of wood off the two tracts and is contracting sales for next season's use at various points throughout Eastern Oregon where he has been selling wood for the past few years. Heretofore he has bought wood already cut, and shipped, but owing to the shortage of wood cut he found it necessary to get out into the timber on his own account. He is doing little shipping now as the ground is too soft in the timber for profitable hauling.
