WAR AND PEACE CASUALTIES

More Spectacular to Lose Limbs in
Battle Than in Factory, but Re-
Education is Necessary.

George Edward Barton, author of "Re-Education," recently gave out a most interesting interview in Washington, where he had gone to see the secretary of war, the French ambassador and the heads of several departments of the surgeon general's office on the subject of the re-education of maimed and crippled soldiers. Mr. Barton, who is head of Consolation House in New York, said in part:

"The needs of the re-education of cripples are not made by war, but are only intensified by it; we draft a whole army of industrial cripples every year. The federal commission on industrial relations gives the annual list of accidents, approximately, 35,000 fatalities and 700,000 injuries involving disability of over four weeks.

"That these figures would be equalled by the casualty list in our army overseas is improbable, and while it is perhaps more spectacular to lose one's arm or leg in the din of the turmoil of battle than it is to lose the same member in that of a mill, factory or foundry, the results—so far as the individual is concerned—are practically the same, and the needs of society for the re-education of that man are identical."

Mr. Barton's book formulates a plan whereby disabled soldiers may be made almost or wholly self-supporting.

MAXWELL TRUCK MAKES GOOD RECORD

What is the world's record for economy of a one ton truck?

"It is believed the championship laurels for this feat go to the Maxwell truck," states the Santa Paula, California, Chronicle.

In a recent test, 20.3 miles per gallon of gasoline is the sensational average made by a Maxwell truck, carrying 3,205 pounds of Violet brand shortening, between Los Angeles and San Diego, a distance of 130 miles. The Maxwell carried its load about \$2 a trip cheaper than freight and drayage charges would have been. Time saved and security against freight congestion, however, are even more important factors.

The Maxwell made a series of three round trips to show the advantage of motor truck transportation over railroad shipments for short hauls. The truck succeeded in achieving the remarkable high figure of more than 14 miles per gallon of gasoline throughout the test.

EARLY DAYS IN OREGON

Dr. McLoughlin, of the Hudson Bay Company, after having the land in the neighborhood of

the company's headquarters at Vancouver prepared for sowing grain, sent to Canada for one bushel each of oats, wheat, barley and corn, as well as a quart of timothy seed. These were brought in overland and planted in their proper seasons in 1825. All but the corn grew well and by 1828 they were producing enough wheat to supply all the demands of the company. They then began to feel the necessity of a mill and one was installed. Its propelling force was horsepower instead of water, and it was after the style of the present coffee grinding machines instead of the subsequent refining system. The first flouring mill in the Willamette valley was in Polk county and the second on Rickreall creek, two miles west of Dallas. It was the flour mill nearest the California gold mines and for years after their discovery, in 1849, pack trains took tens of thousands of pounds of flour to the mines.—Redmond Spokesman.
