The following is the report of work for the month: Socks fifty pairs, sweaters twenty, helmets two, wristlets five pairs, pajama suits forty-two, bed shirts twelve, hospital coats eleven, body braces sixteen, arm slings nine, handkerchiefs four, comfort pillows three, tray cloths one.

WHY NOT POTATOES?

Potatoes are a splendid food; excellent for the body; delicious when well cooked.

Potatoes are a fuel food. They furnish starch which burns in your muscles to let you work, much as gasoline burns in an automobile engine to make the car go. One medium sized potato gives you as much starch as two slices of bread. When you need less bread, therefore potatoes can

save wheat.

They give you salts like other vegetables. You need the salts to build and renew all the parts of your body and to keep in order.

Much depends upon the cooking of the potato. Even the best potatoes can be spoiled by a poor cook. They can be used in many ways in cooking. They are good in bread and can be substituted for 10 to 15 per cent of the wheat flour. They are also good in cake and keep it from drying out. You may use your usual recipe, substituting one cup of mashed potato for one-half cup of milk and one-half cup of flour.

Potatoes, left over or fresh, may be combined with cheese, nuts, meat or other material to make the main dish of a meal.

Try these potato-corn meal muffins: 2 tablespoons fat, 1 tablespoon corn syrup, 1 egg well beaten, 1 cup mashed potato, 1 cup corn meal, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt. Mix in order given. Bake 40 minutes in a moderate oven. This makes 12 muffins.

The wheels are heavy, 34x5 inches, with well seasoned hickory spokes and felloes. There are 12 2½-inch spokes and the tires are solid rubber, 34x5 inches. The chains are the Baldwin roller type, running on 1¼ pitch steel sprockets. The loading space for the body is 10 feet.
