**ADDRESSING LETTERS  
TO THE SOLDIERS**

When you write to a soldier always write with ink and address him by his army title instead of mister, and write his name in full instead of using initials. There are several hundred J. F. Smiths in France and elsewhere in the army. These suggestions come from the post office department at Washington. Another thing, put your own address on the envelope. It takes about 30 days for a letter to reach a soldier with his command in France, although many letters get through in from 15 to 20 days. About 3,000,000 pieces of mail a month go to the soldiers in France. They can be promptly delivered only if addresses are plainly written and address designates company and regiment.

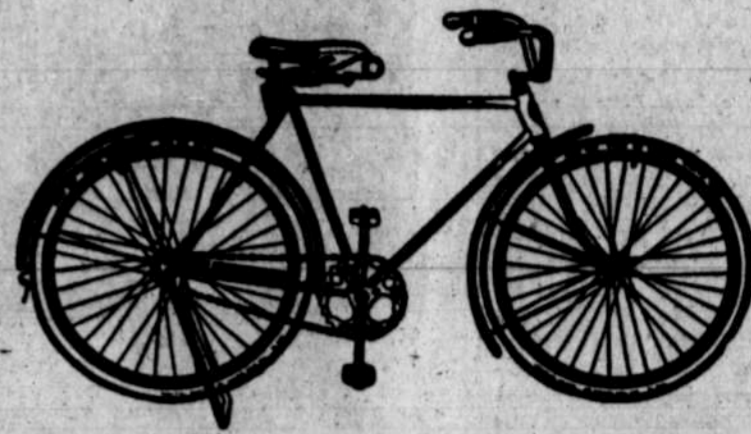
