If you are in the same position as myself, unpledged and unhampered, I would be glad to have your support and vote as well as that of your friends.

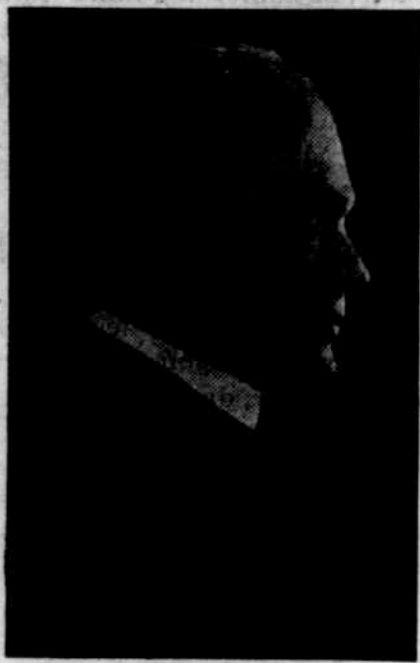

UNITED STATES SENATOR CHARLES L. McNARY
