

WHAT WOMEN OF OREGON ARE DOING IN POLITICS

In almost every part of the state the women are making a house-to-house canvass, lining up their folks to elect Dr. Anderson for governor and they have the faith to believe they will win. One of the leading officials of the state recently said that if Anderson was elected governor it would be the greatest victory yet scored in Oregon.

It is easy to work for Anderson for he has done things worth while and the women like to tell about him. Six years ago when he was mayor of one of the dirtiest towns in Oregon he at once removed the "red light" district, had all tables, chairs and screens taken from the saloons and when he found his chief of police would not enforce the laws he removed him from office and acted as police himself until a man was found who would enforce the law.

Bootlegging in Oregon is on the increase. We need a governor who will enforce the law. Anderson is a clean Christian man who cannot be bought as has been proven in his work in the legislature. He is best known throughout the state as the "Father" of Prohibition, as he introduced in the legislature the prohibition law of 1915 as well as the "bone dry" law of 1917. As a member of the Oregon legislature for three terms, 1913, 1915 and 1917 he was always actively identified with the constructive measures coming before that body, such as mother's pension, permanent registration, workman's compensation, as well as all social hygiene and other moral uplift measures. He supported every measure which promised relief and protection to the men and women who toil. It is not only a privilege but our duty to nominate such a man for governor.

When the bone dry law was passed the temperance people of the state took a long nap from which they have not all yet awakened, while the enemy has been on the alert, never losing an opportunity to tear down and disrupt our law. Today men of money and influence without a vestige of character back of them are seeking the high and important office of governor of Oregon. Whether or not such a man shall be elected depends upon how well the decent citizenship stand together. Hundreds of democrats have registered republican in order to help the other side to nominate a man who would not represent your principles. On the other hand, hundreds of prohibitionists have registered republican in order to vote for Anderson. Now they ask the clean, old-time republican to come forward and cast a vote for a clean man.

In all parts of Oregon the women are organizing and making a house-to-house canvass for Anderson. In one small town it is reported that 1,000 women will vote that way, and of course where there are 1,000 good women there are as many men. Politicians say he is the best man by all odds but he can't be elected, so urge us not to lose our vote. We have heard that sort of stuff before. They told us Oregon wouldn't vote "bone dry," but she did. In Montana they laughed when the women asked for suffrage, but they got suffrage. STATEMENT TO THE PUBLIC

To the voters of Yamhill county—In all my life in Yamhill county, mud-slinging has not been a habit of mine, and it is not my intention to begin now, but it seems necessary to place myself right regarding some reports that have been circulated around over the county.

Early in the campaign, I stated that I was working for the Government without pay, as a member of the local draft board, which was the truth.

The facts in the case are these: The draft board, consisting of the County Clerk, Dr. Cook, county health officer, and myself, devoted much hard work, day and night, (sometimes until midnight) examining the questionnaires of the soldier boys and passing upon the same, in order that the work might be done within the brief time limit set by the Government. As salary blanks were sent to us, we thought that perhaps we were entitled to some compensation for the work, and agreed that as the heaviest burden fell on the Clerk, he should have 15 cents and the other members 7½ cents, making the total 30 cents per name.

Accordingly, we presented our bill for the same. The bill was not allowed, owing to the shortage of funds. At that time I was working without pay from the Government, and so stated in my announcement.

Later, to our surprise, checks were received for the pay, and I at once withdrew my statement from the press, as I did not wish to misrepresent to the voters or secure any favor on such a statement. I immediately invested most of my check in a Liberty Bond, and the small balance remaining I am devoting, to other war assistance, particularly as it affects our home soldier boys.

I think the people of Yamhill county know me well enough to feel confident that I would not take any undue advantage of them or of the Government under which we live and serve, and I only offer this statement to make clear to you what was a seeming contradiction in my advertising, and which was rendered so by the unexpected change in the attitude of the Government regarding pay for its local draft boards.

I am asking the votes of the people wholly on any merits I may possess to fill the office as demonstrated by past experience and not with any desire to be fuddle or misrepresent to the people anything regarding my acts.

I have always held the office as a sacred trust, and shall continue to do so, if the people of the county see fit to have me.

UNITED STATES SENATOR CHARLES L. McNARY



Because United States Senator Charles L. McNary has made good he should be nominated to succeed himself in the Republican Primary—May 17.

Senator McNary was born on a farm in Oregon; reared in the Baptist church; educated in the public schools; worked his way through Stanford University; is a lawyer and farmer and has been a life-long Republican. He was formerly a Justice on the Supreme Court and later chairman of the State Republican Central Committee.
