Those who went from Newberg to attend the State Encampment of the G. A. R. at Albany the first of the week were Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Moore, Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Pike, Mr. and Mrs. Pittman, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hopkins and daughter, W. H. Brooks, Levi Dobbins and Dr. Brunson. They are profuse in their praise of the treatment they received at the hands of the Albany people.

The body of Miss Ruth Dery, a granddaughter of Randolph Fairbanks, aged 26 years, was brought here for burial on the morning train. Funeral services were conducted at the Hodson & Elliott chapel by Rev. B. L. Hicks. Deceased lost her life as a result of the overturning of an automobile when she was returning from a trip to Rainier Park in company with three soldiers and a driver. Lieutenants John S. Robson and Paul C. Hassler, two of the men who were in the car at the time of the accident, and others from Portland who were her friends, came out with the body to attend the funeral.

Paul J. Furnas, of Indianapolis, field secretary of the American Friends Service Committee, gave an illustrated lecture at Friends church on last Saturday night and repeated it again on Sunday night. Mr. Furnas is a young man who gave up his business to engage in this work.
