The road paving crew expect to reach Newberg Friday evening or some time Saturday if the rain holds off. Everybody get ready for the bell ringing.

The voters of Yamhill county seem to have settled down to the conviction that Capt. H. S. Maloney is the man to retain in the recorder's office, since he is to have no opposition. C. B. Wilson, county clerk, is another who has clear sailing. Rather depressing for the job printer and newspaper man.

With colored news print paper selling at double former prices, the Democratic ballot, 10½ by 15½ inches, and containing the names of only ten candidates for state and county offices, looked like a waste of good material. In fact, it resembled a conservation lunch counter bill of fare, minus the regulation substitutes.

The Red Cross drive is on this week and the soliciting committees say contributions are coming in easy—much easier than they have in either of the previous drives made. People are learning, both the pressing necessity for funds and how to give; and consequently little argument is required when calls are made by the committees.

Bruce Dennis, of the LeGrande Observer, tackled a pretty big job when he undertook to defeat Ralph Williams for National committeeman, and further, his activity in the Bull Moose ranks where he ranked as one of the leaders in Oregon, has not been entirely forgotten by many members of the G. O. P. who evidently shied at making him their pilot. It was all so sudden on his part.

Our friend Elbert Bede, of the Cottage Grove Sentinel, who was a candidate on the Republican ticket for the nomination for joint senator for Linn and Lane counties is now in the class of the also-rans. Elbert should have known that the voters would not pick a man of his intelligence to represent them in the legislature and Cottage Grove wouldn't want to spare him from home for forty days in the winter season anyway.

Miss Alice L. Adams, who was defeated for the nomination for county treasurer to succeed herself, takes her defeat cheerfully and in a letter to the Graphic expresses her appreciation of the big vote she received in Newberg. It was not on account of any lack of efficiency in the office which she has held for two terms that she failed to receive the nomination, and she will doubtless easily secure a position at the expiration of her term at a better salary than the office pays.

Election boards had some trouble in convincing voters who registered as members of minority parties that had no tickets in the field that they must change their registration in order to vote at the primary, as there were but two tickets, the Republican

and Democrat, out. Under the old convention system when a party met to nominate candidates it would have been considered a very cheeky affair, to say the least, for members of other parties to go into the convention halls and insist on the privilege of voting, and it should be borne in mind that the primary system takes the place of the convention and is supposed to protect parties from the intrusion of those who affiliate with other parties.

OBITUARY

Mrs. Wm. Perkins died at her home north of Newberg Thursday, May 16, after an illness of two years or more, aged 66 years, although she was confined to her room only five weeks before her death.

She will be greatly missed, not only by the members of her own family but by neighbors and friends everywhere, for in homes where distress, sickness or death entered she was there to help, and it was a great regret to her when failing health prevented her from doing this.

The bread she cast upon the waters came back to her in her sickness in loving ministrations by neighbors and friends.

Ardelia Catherine Willson was born in Pennsylvania August 26, 1851. In 1854 she with her parents moved to Minnesota, where on October 5, 1871, she was married to Wm. Perkins. To them were born one son and four daughters, Minnie, now Mrs. H. L. Owen, of Newberg, Cora Ethel, now Mrs. J. W. Curry, Harry, Hazel, now Mrs. F. W. Bilyeu, and Olive, all of Portland. An adopted daughter, Garnet, died nine years ago.

She with her husband and children, with the exception of one daughter, came to Newberg, October 30, 1899.

In her early years she was converted and joined the Methodist church, but a few years later she and her companion became members of the Seventh Day Adventist church to which they have been faithful 42 years.

Funeral services were conducted in the M. E. church Saturday at 3 o'clock p. m. Her husband, son, daughters and four grandchildren were with her when she passed away.

YOUNG MEN OF 21 MUST REGISTER ON JUNE 5

John M. Williams, Adjutant-General of Oregon, has addressed a communication to all newspapers of the state asking their earnest co-operation in giving the widest publicity to the date of Registration day, and to facts concerning it, as follows:

Official Statement Issued

"On Wednesday, June 5, every 21-year-old man in the United States must appear at the registration place designated by his local draft board and register," says a statement issued by Captain John E. Cullison, O. R. C., in charge of the execution of the draft law in Oregon.

"The only exceptions are men already in the military or naval service. Special arrangements have been made whereby absentees and those too ill to appear at the registration places may register by mail.

"But they must all register. Failure to do so makes the guilty young man liable to imprisonment for one year. And ignorance of the fact that June 5 is Registration day will not be accepted as an excuse. The burden of informing themselves as to the place and date of registration is placed on the men themselves.

"Registration will be in charge of local boards in their respective districts. They are required to post immediately a list of registration places.

"The registration places will

be open from 7 o'clock the morning of June 5 until 9 o'clock that night. They will be in charge of officials of the local draft boards.

"June 5 has been selected as the date for Registration day because it is the anniversary of the first draft Registration day, when approximately 10,000,000 men between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, registered for the draft.

"This Registration day is only for men who have reached the age of 21 years, thus coming within the draft age, since last Registration day."

MEDAL OF HONOR WELL WON

Steamfitter's Bravery Promptly and Fittingly Recognized by the United States Government.

The honor of receiving the first medal of honor awarded during the war with Germany belongs to Patrick McGunigal, a ship's fitter, first class, attached to the U. S. S. Huntington, who received this token for extraordinary heroism. Early in September, while the ship was passing through the war zone, a kite balloon was sent up with Lieut. Henry W. Hoyt, U. S. N., as observer. When 400 feet up, the temperature dropping, the balloon descended 200 feet and was struck by a squall. It started on a nose dive to the sea and was rolling over. Tangled ropes overhead made it impossible for the pilot to get out of the basket which trailed in the water, while the man thus held a prisoner was submerged. With great daring McGunigal climbed down the side of the ship, jumped to the ropes leading to the basket, and cleared the tangle. Reaching the pilot, McGunigal placed a bowline around the exhausted man's waist and he was safely hauled to the deck. Another bowline was lowered to McGunigal and he was taken aboard. In making the medal award Secretary of the Navy Daniels referred to McGunigal's act in rescuing this young officer as an extraordinary exhibition of self-sacrifice, as the steamfitter knew that if he failed there was no chance of himself being saved. In addition to receiving the medal, McGunigal was given a gratuity of \$100.

PLANT PRODUCES RED INK.

A plant known as "irguan" which produces red ink that is adaptable to various uses has been discovered in Tecambaro, state of Michoacan, Mex., according to a dispatch from Vice Consul Luther K. Zabrickie of Mexico City.
