UNLIKE OLD TIMES

Town Meetings Not Just as They Used to Be.

"W-a-a-a-a, Cap'n," began Grindle the storekeeper, "th' annual meeting of the legal voters o' this town, to meet an' act upon certain articles to-wit, namely, ain't nothin' what it used to be. Times is changed wonderfully, especially since the war broke out."

Two Brave Marines.

On the first day of February, 1918, there was an explosion in a seaplane hangar on an aviation field near Washington. The explosion started a fire which set ablaze the clothing of a chief petty officer of the navy. The death of the petty officer and the destruction of the costly hangar were imminent. Privates William E. Lawton and Raymond J. Burnap, United States marines from the Washington navy yard, were on duty nearby. Arming themselves with fire extinguishers, they dashed to the rescue. The life of the petty officer was saved and the destruction of the hangar prevented. Secretary Daniels wrote a personal letter to each of the marines, commending him for his coolness and presence of mind in the face of sudden danger. Private Lawton enlisted in the marine corps on August 4, 1914, at Norfolk, Va. Private Burnap joined the soldiers of the sea at Philadelphia on July 21, 1917.

Telephones in Canada.

A most remarkable increase is evidenced in the use of the telephone in Canada during the past five years, according to a report recently laid upon the table of the house of commons. The number of telephones in use throughout the Dominion in 1912 was 370,884, while in 1917 the number had grown to 804,138. The number of telephone companies operating in 1912 was 683, and five years later there were 1,659 companies in operation. A total of 889,572 miles of wire was in use during the year 1912. In 1917 the wire mileage was 1,708,202. The capitalization of telephone companies also shows a great increase in the five-year period. In 1912 it was \$42,278,851, while in June, 1917, it was \$79,121,702. The revenue during the same period had grown approximately \$8,000,000. The number of persons for each telephone in the Dominion in 1912, was 19.3 and in 1917, 13.4.

Cautious Galveston.

Many persons remember the destruction of Galveston by a West Indian hurricane which blew so hard it forced the sea up into the streets of the city and thousands of lives were lost. As a protection against a similar disaster, the city built a great sea wall. This year it has begun nearly two miles more of sea wall which will take nearly two years to complete and which will cost \$2,000,000. After the great storm of 1900, the citizens raised the site of the city 17½ feet by pumping millions of tons of sand from the gulf. Galveston has taxed itself for all these colossal improvements.—Exchange.

GROWTH OF ENGLISH COURTS

Machinery for Administering Justice Has Been a Steady, if Somewhat Slow Process.

Glanville wrote the first English law book about 1175. From that treatise, states Hon. Walter Clark, in Case and Comment, we may get a fairly good idea of the common law toward the end of the reign of Henry II. In the lord's court were brought all the suits of the villein tenants and all suits concerning land held by the lord, who might, however, adjourn any question of difficulty into the king's court. The ecclesiastical courts had jurisdiction of marriage and legitimacy, of wills, and of all matters concerning the church. The king's court, or county court, gradually took shape and acquired from time to time more general jurisdiction, as was natural. The law of tenures was, of course, early settled, but the rules of inheritance were uncertain and the right to dispose of property by will was not enacted until late in the reign of Henry VIII, many centuries later. The modern mortgage was unknown and the law of personal property was little developed. The king's courts from time to time created new forms of writs, the writs of detinue and case being among the first established. The writ of debt would lie to recover a loan or for a sale, but redress for breach of ordinary contracts could be obtained only in the ecclesiastical courts, which dealt with the sin of deceit. Not for three centuries did the king's courts work out a doctrine by which a party might be held to perform a simple contract.
