HOW TO RATION SUGAR

Just how many teaspoonsfuls in a pound of sugar? If the spoon is just level full, 96 to the pound. If you are trying to limit table consumption to one pound a month, you could use three of these skimpy teaspoonsful each day. The rounded spoonful runs about 48 to the pound or one and a half daily. The heaping teaspoonful averages 32 to the pound. That would be one a day. If you are heaping the spoon more than once a day you are using some other fellow's sugar.

Addressed to the Editor of the Fun-nyphone Register.

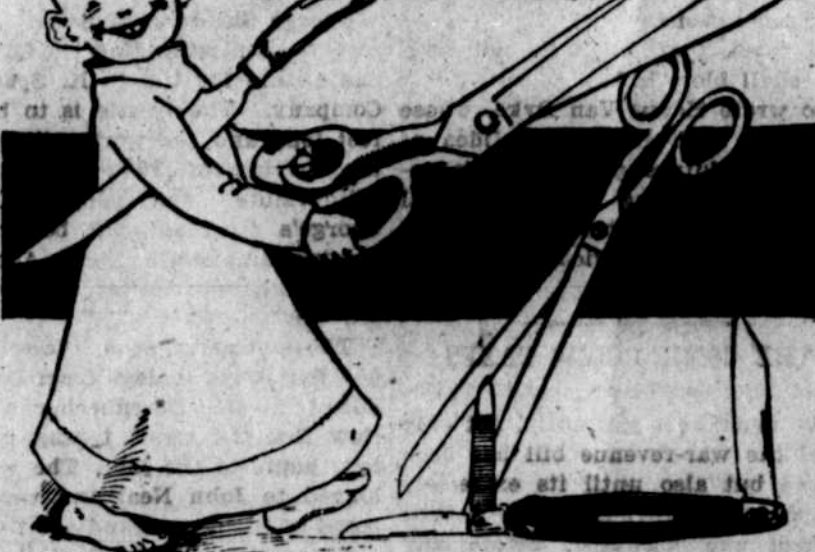
