

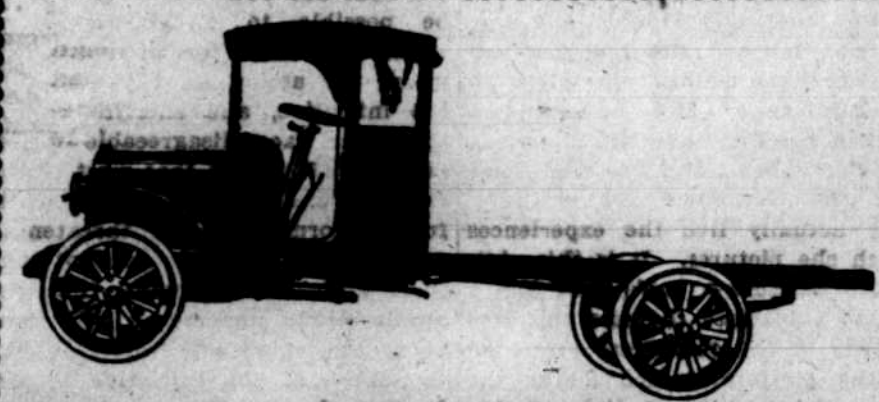

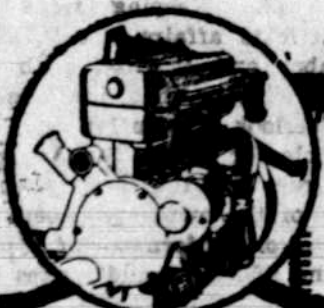

The Dundee community is in receipt of the two following interesting letters from our boys in France:

On Active Service with the American Expeditionary Forces, October 5.

Dear Friends and Neighbors—Your most welcome letters came as a complete surprise and cheered the end of a long, hard day. You think it little, but how it helps. We know you are back of us when we read of the record sale of bonds and the food economy. Just saw a few lines in the Paris edition of the

New York Herald that "Old Oregon" as usual went over the top in subscribing for war bonds—Liberty. I should have said. Understood all of the American and the guerre part of the French as we have heard that in loud bunches for the last few days, and could see the flash of the guns at night.

It is not my privilege to be at the front but am in the advance section and am a member of the Service of Supply forces.

You don't read much about us in the papers but the boys on the firing line know that we are back here. Not a lot of glory but plenty of hard work. A little rain don't stop things here. We are somewhere in the Vosges Mountains in the pine forests. Just plain lumberjacks, and we are going some at that. When it comes to work, will soon qualify for a member of the Mazamas, as everything is just a bed of loose granite or rock, slides and does everything but stand on edge.

This is a pretty country to look at, but when it comes to other things it is standing still, but will get a lot of good things from Americans.

Can't say that I fancy having the house and barn under the same roof, as that makes things not a bed of violets.

Old things are everywhere in this country and the people are hero worshipers to a great extent and have fought hard for liberty and to keep their country.

There is little fruit of any kind in this district so don't get any. But the lowly prune is a good substitute and makes me think of home every time I see them.

We have quite a hill—whoo—mountain to climb coming up from town and the days are short and the nights are long so don't go down very often.

You should see us trying to buy things in the French stores. Nuts are the main standby. Dictionaries are handy but sometimes it is necessary to use sign language and the people are slow at picking up pantomime. We bought suspenders—word not in dictionary. Three engineers run fingers up both sides of chest, front, turn subject, ditto across the back, then give trousers a hitch. Mademoiselle clerk blushes rosy and says: "O. Oui compres—O. yes, I understand."

Candy is scarce here, looks good, tastes like nothing and comes high. The best we can do for sweets is chocolate and a sweet biscuit like Nabisco wafers, but is too high for the French to buy. Eggs are around one dollar a dozen in United States money, but are hard to get all the time now.

We have had two heavy frosts so far but no cold weather yet. The

last few days have been cool and cloudy but not raining.

Am still feeling fine and get my share of the chow three times a day. We are all hoping that this war will be over soon and we all want this good weather to last another month anyway.

Hope this finds you all well and the prunes all cared for.
