Toose, reading clerk; Colonel G. W. D. Mercer, sergeant-at-arms; J. A. Linville, door keeper; Thane Livesay, mailing clerk. Robert Ruhl was named assistant sergeant-at-arms by virtue of a resolution creating the place.
