

SERVED HIS COUNTRY LONG

Turkish Ambassador to London Had Record That No Other Diplomat Has Approached.

Only one diplomat has surpassed the record of M. Paul Cambon in completing 20 years' service as ambassador in London. Musurus Pasha, who was a Cretan, went to London in 1851 as minister plenipotentiary for Turkey, received the rank of ambassador in 1856, and retained his post until 1871. The most grievous time of his career occurred in 1867, when Sultan Abdul Aziz visited England and was offered the Order of the Star of India. As he was already a G. C. B. the sultan denied this offer an insult, and Musurus had hard work to prevent his master leaving the country in dudgeon. Eventually Queen Victoria invested him with the Garter. The ceremony took place off Osborne, on the quarterdeck of the royal yacht, in the midst of a raging storm and with curtailed oaths, for, as Musurus pointed out, they could not expect the sultan to swear that he would "pursue the infidel to death." The following night there was a reception at the Indian office in honor of the sultan. As Mme. Musurus, the ambassador's wife, was going in to supper she was seized with a heart attack and dropped dead.

FROM MILLIONS TO PENURY

Luis Terrazas, the Former Mexican Grandee, Knows How Bitter Is the Lot of the Fallen.

A former cattle king of Mexico, once worth millions, today lives in exile on the border and is forced to count his pennies. His name is Luis Terrazas. He virtually lost all of his \$20,000,000 fortune in the revolution of Madero and Villa. He was called "Don Luis" and his estate stretched from the Rio Grande to Chihuahua City. He could ride for 24 hours by train over his own acres, which numbered more than a million. With his family he lived in a marble palace on the Alameda at Quinta Carolina, his summer home on the plains.

Today Terrazas and his family occupy a rented house. He rides to his office in an old automobile and buys his groceries at a cash-and-carry store. He has ten sons, seventy-five grandchildren and is eighty-nine years old.

The revolutionists killed the old man's cattle for food, burned his ranch buildings and looted his stores. Later Carranza confiscated Terrazas' holdings and banished him from Mexico.

FISH HAD SWALLOWED SEAL

Remarkable Recovery of Memento Which Had Been Lost for a Great Number of Years.

A jade seal belonging to a famous general of the Ming dynasty was found recently inside a fish, according to a Chinese daily. A fisherman, living outside one of the city gates, caught a fish weighing over 50 pounds. When he dressed it for sale he found inside the jade seal, about half an inch square and one inch thick.

The seal bears the name of Tai Chikuang. The letters are engraved in the Chuan style and are still legible. The finder did not know the value of the seal and parted with it for a dollar. The new owner took it to curio experts and was assured it was genuine. He sold it later to a foreign collector for \$500.

The rare quality of the jade and engraving convinced the experts that it was the property of the great General Tai Chikuang, who flourished in the later part of the Ming dynasty and whose deeds in the suppression of the Japanese pirates who infested the Chinese coast have rendered his name a household word.

BANISHING THE BARBERRY.

As the alternation of the grain rust, Puccinia graminis, between wheat and the common barberry, is a very old story among botanists, it is curious that determined efforts to banish barberry from the wheat-growing regions of this country should not have antedated the present year. Last summer the federal horticultural board invited the co-operation of more than 6,000 nurserymen throughout the United States in attempts to eradicate this plant. The nurserymen have quite generally signed pledges not to ship Berberis vulgaris to the Upper Mississippi valley and a campaign is under way to exterminate the plant in the same region. It should be noted that the ornamental Japanese barberry (B. thunbergii) is not a factor in spreading rust and there is therefore no reason for its destruction.—Scientific American.

REJOICE IN FREE PALESTINE

Polish People in the United States Extend Congratulations to Gen. Allenby on His Victory.

The Poles of the United States, through the Polish national department at Chicago, have sent felicitations to General Allenby, allied commander in Palestine, upon his occupation of Palestine and defeat of the Turkish army. When, some days ago, the newspapers carried the report of the successes of the allied arms in the near East, the Polish organization for the United States sent a request to Count Zamoyski, acting head of the Polish national committee at Paris, asking that such congratulations be extended. Count Zamoyski's message, in which the Poles of this country participated, reads as follows:

"What Christianity has dreamed for many centuries, what has been sung and foretold by poets, and why crusades have been waged is realized. The Holy Land has been freed from the hands of its oppressors, and for this freedom it can be grateful to the valiant British troops who, under your brilliant generalship, have performed undertakings which shall forever remain in the history of war."

"The occupation of Palestine and the defeat of the Turkish army simultaneously are strong blows at the falling structure of power based on force. Being fully aware of the importance of the deeds performed by you and your troops we transmit to you our most hearty congratulations and wishes for further success."
