

NEW TELEPHONE LONG DISTANCE OR TOLL RATES

By courtesy of the Newberg Telephone Company we are enabled to give the method of computing charges on telephone toll calls under which all toll rates throughout the United States are placed on a standard basis effective at 12:01 a. m. January 31, 1919.

A brief description of this new method and of its application to several classes of service offered and the new rates to a few nearby points, are here given.

"Station to Station" Rate: When a person makes a toll call without specifying that conversation is desired with a particular person, the "station to station" rate applies. "Station to station" calls should be made by number or by name and address of the subscriber at the telephone called.

"Person to Person" Rate: When a person makes a toll call, specifying that conversation is desired with a particular person, the "person to person" rate applies.

New rates between Newberg and the following points are:

Portland—Station to Station: 25 cents for 5 minutes; 5 cents for each added 2 minutes. Person to Person: 30 cents for 3 minutes. 5 cents for each added 1 minute.

Salem—Station to Station: 30 cents for 3 minutes. 10 cents for each added 1 minute. Person to Person: 35 cents for 3 minutes. 10 cents for each added 1 minute.

Sheridan—Station to Station: 20 cents for 5 minutes. 5 cents for each added 2 minutes. Person to Person: 25 cents for 3 minutes. 5 cents for each added 1 minute.

Eugene—Station to Station: 60 cents for 3 minutes. 20 cents for each added 1 minute. Person to Person: 75 cents for 3 minutes. 25 cents for each added 1 minute.

Oregon City—Station to Station: 20 cents for 5 minutes. 5 cents for each added 2 minutes. Person to Person: 25 cents for 3 minutes. 5 cents for each added 2 minutes.

McMinnville, LaFayette, Amity, Carleton and Sherwood take Station to Station rate only, and are all the same—10 cents for 5 minutes and 1 cent for each added minute.

Night rates are on Station to Station basis only 8:30 to 12, midnight, are about half the day rate.

A leaflet now being generally distributed by the Telephone Company gives comprehensive information for the proper and economical use of the long distance service and should be carefully studied.

The next issue of the Portland Telephone directory will give a more detailed description and actual rates to certain points and more general information.

of ammunition following the boys—supplies of all kinds, heavy and light artillery, field itckens, everything that could be needed for an advanced position. There was such congestion that we'd move a car's length and wait half an hour or more. Some of the boys on the trucks knew me and begged for a song. I stood up on the bank at the side of the road and went to it. No Man's Land was a ravine. The German's had been on one hill and the Americans on the other. The road led down through what had been a village now about one hundred yards from where I stood. There was not one wall standing! Each side of the road was a mass of barbed wire. In front of me was a sixteen-inch camouflaged cannon and on this hundreds of boys were sitting listening to me.

I couldn't realize what I was going through. It seemed as though I were in a trance!

Then we were moving again. Everywhere along the road the boys were so astonished at seeing a girl that they whooped. We went so slowly that I could see their names on their gas masks and I'd say, "Hello, Mr. Donovan," etc., just to see their jaws drop. I never saw so many men at one time in my life! All America was on or beside that road as we pushed over ground held by Germans for four years. German signs, German dugouts! But the German had fled.—Crystal Waters, in January Sunset.

LIMESTONE GETS RESULTS

Broome county, New York, this year used 8,000 tons of limestone, an increase of 3,000 tons over the amount used one year ago. This increase has been due to the emphasis which the farm bureau and county agent have placed upon the value of applying limestone to the soil. One farmer applied one ton of ground limestone an acre in 1917 at the time of seeding. In 1918 the limed area produced 5,324 pounds of hay, while the plot beside it having no lime produced only 4,017 pounds, 1,307 pounds in favor of lime. Another farmer top-dressed hay land

land, that had been mowed one year, with one-half ton of marl per acre. On the limed area he secured 4,200 pounds of hay and on the unlimed area 2,160 pounds a difference of 2,040 pounds. Still another farmer used 1 ton of lime an acre at the time of seeding. On the limed acre he produced 5,324 pounds of hay and on the unlimed acre 2,904 pounds, a difference of 2,420 pounds in favor of limestone.—U. S. Department of Agriculture.

A FOOTHILL FARMER'S VIEWS

BIG CROP YIELD FOR OREGON

crease of \$2,000,000 over a year ago. Who has not heard of Oregon apples? Those who have not tasted the fruit grown in this state scarcely know what a real apple is like. Everywhere the Oregon apple is known as the standard by which all other apples are judged. The value of this year's crop was over \$6,000,000.

Total value for Oregon 1918 fruit crop was \$20,216,000 compared with \$13,882,000 a year ago, or over three times the value of the crop of 1914.

Vegetable production in the state reached a total value of \$36,055,000 for the season compared with \$27,835,000 a year ago, which is the greatest value ever known in Oregon despite the extraordinarily dry season which cut down to a considerable extent the size of the crops. It was a big season for the salmon industry with a value of \$7,000,000 for 1918, an increase of a cool million dollars over the season of 1917.

Dairy products of Oregon showed a far greater value than ever before during the season with a total showing of \$33,900,000 compared with \$26,670,000 a year ago. This increase is by far the greatest known and is remarkable in view of the fact that production was curtailed by the protracted dry season which affected practically the entire Pacific slope.
