A news note from Redmond gives information of the death of Harvey E. Whitman who was taken suddenly from neuralgia of the heart, following an attack of influenza. The deceased was a relative of the J. C. McCrea family and was engaged in the jewelry business in Newberg several years ago.

Dorothy, the twelve-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grant Heater, of Springbrook, died on last Friday from goiter and other complications. Funeral services were held at the W. W. Hollingsworth Co. chapel on Sunday afternoon, conducted by Rev. Carl Miller, pastor of Springbrook Friends church.

Vernon Gould, who was discharged from the service at Vancouver a few days ago where he had been playing with a military band since entering the service last spring, has been in town during the week. He will open a jewelry business soon but has not yet settled on a location. Since the above was written he has leased the east room of the Klenle building where he will set up shop.

The bride mentioned in the following news note from Dallas is a daughter of the J. W. Thomas who lost his life here a few years ago by the accidental discharge of a gun while out hunting: "By the marriage this week of Rolfe E. Brown and Miss Leona Thomas, of Salt Creek, J. H. Brown, the boy's father, becomes his stepfather. The young Mr. Brown's wife is a daughter of the former Mrs. Thomas, to whom the elder Brown was united in marriage about one year ago. The bridegroom was recently discharged from service at Camp Lewis.

Ellis Pickett will leave in a few days for Healdsburg, Sonoma county, California, to again resume work as science teacher in the high school, a position which he gave up when he answered the draft call. The school board wrote him before Christmas offering him the place but as he had not then received his discharge he could not get away to accept it. A few days ago a second call came from the school board saying the man who had taken the place was not satisfactory and the offer to him was renewed and he accepted. His parents who recently sold their place out north of Newberg, will go in the course of a few weeks.

Asa F. Sutton, who came here with his family from Montana some months ago, and who has been holding a position as salesman in the Miller Mercantile Co. store, has bought the "Shady Nook" farm of S. W. Newhouse, located two miles north of Newberg, consisting of forty acres. The price paid was \$175 per acre. He also bought the stock and farming implements. Mr. Sutton farmed in Montana for several years but sold out before coming here. Mr. Newhouse says he was compelled to give up farming on account of physical disabilities that incapacitate him for steady and vigorous "farm diet." It is likely that he will move into town.

Zimri Ellis, George Hodges, Darrell Hall and Donald M. McDonald, who enlisted some time ago for the Merchant Marine, came home from Seattle last week after having received what they supposed were discharges from the service. A few days later they were informed by L. B. Ferguson, the local recruiting officer, that he had received an inquiry from the Seattle office for them and that they were listed as deserters. J. C. Cooper, the McMinnville walnut enthusiast, informs the Graphic that the Western Walnut Association will meet in Portland at the Portland hotel on Thursday and Friday of next week, February 6 and 7.

On last Monday morning Frank Haynes, son of Warren Haynes, wood hauler for the saw mill, fell from a loaded wagon when a wheel dropped into a chuck hole and a wheel passed over his ankle, breaking both bones. He was taken to Portland and placed in St. Vincent's hospital for treatment.

Omar Fendall was called to McMinnville this morning on account of the illness of Mrs. Fendall from appendicitis, necessitating an operation, as stated by Dr. Goucher, the attending physician. She went to McMinnville a few days ago to visit her sister, Mrs. C. B. Wilson. A reception that had been planned for Mr. and Mrs. Fendall for this evening has been called off.

The heavy motor truck travel has proved the undoing of a lot of road work on the Ramsey hill on the south side of Chehalis creek, and last Friday and Saturday Elmer Hollingsworth and S. P. Timberlake had a good run of business pulling machines through a stretch where the gravel broke through. The place has been patched up since so that it is passable.

Ryan, who has held a position as salesman in the dry goods department in the Miller Mercantile Co. store for the past six years, will sever his connection with the firm on February 8, when he will go to Condon to take a similar position in a store there. He was a man of good character, quiet and rather reserved, and was highly respected by his neighbors.

WILLAMETTE RIVER TRANSPORTATION TO BE RENEWED

The Capital City Navigation Company will open river transportation on the Willamette River between Portland, Salem and Independence, on next Tuesday morning. The company has leased the steamer, "Pomona," and has options on other boats. The Pomona will make her first trip from Ash street dock. The company will maintain said service, leaving Ash street dock on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, at 7:00 a. m. The steamer will leave Independence at 6:00 a. m. and Salem at 7:00 a. m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

The company will conduct actual competition to the rail rates. A flat rate to Salem on merchandise of \$3.50 per ton, and to Independence of \$4.00 per ton, will be inaugurated and maintained. Other similar rates on other commodities will be maintained. This company is independent of the Oregon City Transportation Company, and of any of the railway lines.

The owners of the company will devote their personal services to the work. Capt. Chris Blum will be Master, Capt. Ed Williams will be Pilot, W. S. Jayes, Purser, and V. A. Burns, Steward, of the steamer Pomona, and will have personal supervision of the affairs of the company.
