

FORMER YAMHILL COUNTY ATTORNEY AND JUDGE DIES

Last Sunday's Oregonian gave the following notice of the death of Judge Magers, formerly of McMinnville:

J. E. Magers, Oregon pioneer and prominent attorney of the state, died at the age of 70 years at his new suburban home at Rialto Station at noon yesterday, following an illness of one week from diabetes.

Mr. Magers was known widely as Judge Magers, having served one term as County Judge at McMinnville, Yamhill county. He was born at McMinnville, Ohio, 70 years ago, and crossed the plains in 1852 with his parents, Dr. and Mrs. W. B. Magers, who later became known to all of the early pioneers of the state. The little family located at Oregon City.

Judge Magers graduated from Willamette University, Salem, and later became one of the early presidents of McMinnville College. Later he attended Ann Arbor Law School at Ann Arbor, Michigan, and returned to McMinnville after graduation to practice law. He was, for many years, one of the most prominent residents of the upper river town and served as county judge there for one term. He came to Portland 20 years ago and had resided there ever since.

Judge Magers was a past president of the Oregon Pioneer Association and a member of the Masonic order. Several years ago he was chairman of the state Republican committee. While residing in Portland, he had been a prominent member of the East Side Baptist church. Up to the time of his death he conducted law offices at 902 Yeon building.

Judge Magers is survived by his widow, Mrs. Dida E. Magers; two daughters, Mrs. George L. Roth, of Portland, and Mrs. L. F. Webster, of Corvallis; four sisters, Mrs. W. S. Thompson, of Harrington, Washington; Mrs. S. E. Woodington, of Silverton, Oregon; Mrs. J. B. Feller and Minetta Magers, both of Portland; and two brothers, A. G. Magers, of San Francisco, and James P. Magers, of Dallas.

THE GRAPHIC RECEIVES "FAVORABLE MENTION"

In a write-up given Gene Simpson, the proprietor of "Simpson's Pheasant Farm" at Corvallis, in the Reliable Poultry Journal, he is quoted as follows:

"The first pair of birds I ever sold was to a newspaper man, and it was to newspaper publicity that I really got on my feet in the business. Any newspaper item in a local paper pertaining to the rearing and shipping of pheasants was copied far and wide all over the United States. Some shipments of unusual interest would be taken up by the Associated Press. Mr. E. H. Woodward, editor of the Newberg Graphic, Newberg, Oregon, bought the first pair of pheasants I ever sold, and, strange as it may seem, he paid me cash for them, not even suggesting that I take it out in advertising. This pair of birds was sent to Mr. Woodward's brother in Haviland, Kansas. The State Game Department of Kansas, no doubt learning of the shipment of this pair of birds through a local Kansas newspaper article, later bought several dozen Chinese pheasants from me, and the following year offered me five dollars per pair for two thousand pair to be raised and delivered the next season. This number was beyond my capacity at that time, but a single order for ten thousand dollars worth of pheasants looked like real business, so I have been raising pheasants ever since."
