

HOW CLEOPATRA'S NEEDLE WAS SAVED

New Process Invented to Preserve Surface of Monolith in Central Park.

MIROGLYPHS OBLITERATED.

Rigors of Western Climate Caused Khedive's Gift to Disintegrate. Painting Ancient Obelisk With Special Preparation Stay of Decay—Ruined Portions Restored.

New Yorkers awoke one morning to find in their breakfast headlines the news that a zealous park employee had discovered signs of disintegration on the surface of the city's most treasured antique—Cleopatra's Needle. Photographs revealed that the monolith was peeling, large pieces of sandstone having fallen from the tall shaft, carrying with them part of the prized hieroglyphs.

London's twin sister of Cleopatra's Needle was reported as resting comfortably and enduringly on the banks of the Thames, and the rival port wondered whether a preparation would be found to stay the attacks of their harsher climate.

Such a preparation was soon forthcoming. A new paint combination as a preservative for stone was invented.

THE OBELISK.

The Obelisk was presented to the City of New York by the Khedive of Egypt, Lieutenant Commander Gervasio, U. S. N., after a three years' effort to obtain possession of it and moved it to its present position at an expense of nearly \$100,000. It is 218 feet high, weighs 2,325 tons, and is 18 feet square at the base. The height of the obelisk is 218 feet, 3 inches. The measurement of the base square through its axis is 18 feet, 3 inches. The weight of the monolith is 2,325 tons.

Since it was quarried near the tomb of Seti I, it is believed to be of the same material as the obelisk at Heliopolis, Egypt, which was destroyed by the Romans.

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YANKS IN ACTION SHOWN IN BIG U. S. LOAN FILM

"New Glory for Old" to Be Released During Victory Loan Drive.

The greatest war film ever produced, "New Glory for Old," is to be distributed throughout the United States in aid of the Victory Liberty Loan. In this great film will be shown every activity of the U. S. army and navy in the war including 1,000 feet of the hardest fighting by the Yanks.

The five reels of 5,000 feet will be shown as a feature of special Liberty Loan made meetings and it is planned that no admission charge will be made.

"New Glory for Old" was taken as a part of the pictorial history of the world war by the United States Signal Corps and one operator was killed while operating his camera. It contains the most thrilling pictorial reproduction of fighting that has yet been shown.

The American soldier is shown in this film from the time of enlistment to his arrival in Berlin. No part of this film has ever been shown and "New Glory for Old" will be held by the war department for the use of Liberty Loan publicity.

Many other special films are being prepared for use in the coming campaign. Douglas Fairbanks and Julian Bingham have each produced Victory Liberty Loan films which have been turned over to the Liberty Loan committee.

PEOPLE NOT ARMY. NOW HOLD STAGE

"We are rounding out one of the greatest, if not the greatest single drama in the world's history. The most tragic scene is over and another is being acted, and in this scene it is the mass of the American people that hold the center of the stage rather than the American armies. The latter have practically completed their work and they played their part with superb excellence. It is our part now to finish their work."

"We have got to finish financing the war and to finance the peace. We have got to pay for those things we bought or contracted for, to take the best possible care of our soldier boys and to make them the superb fighting force that they were. We have got to care for the wounded and their dependents and the dependents of those who died in their country's service. We have got to rehabilitate our wounded and train them for useful occupations which they can pursue in spite of loss of limbs or sight or other such injuries."

Next Finish Task.

"We have got to stand by the people of these nations who were associated with us in the war against Germany and who have been under the cruel hand of German domination. We have got to finish in all ways the great and the very glorious task that America set out to accomplish in April, 1917, and which so far has been accomplished with a success that every true American rejoices at and is proud of."

"This is a task that no good American—man, woman or child—will shrink or will wish to shrink. And every one of them, man, woman and child, can help. Through the Liberty Loan and War Savings Stamps the United States offers each and all an opportunity to contribute to its great work of establishing world justice, world liberty and world enduring peace."

I went right down stairs in the store and bought nine thrift stamps and stuck those quarters in the thrift card where they could not get away before the end of the month. I do the same thing when I have saved a single quarter or half dollar, and I am seriously thinking of getting a little penny bank to hold saved pennies or dimes until they grow to thrift stamp size. What is more, I am getting a whole lot of fun out of this most fascinating game, the game of 'Getting Ahead.'"

OPPOSED OIL PIPE LINES

Teamsters Defeated Proposition Which Had Its Origin in Brain of Herman Jones, Pennsylvanian.

It was an American, Herman Jones of Erie, Pa., who first conceived the idea of the construction of an oil pipe line. It was to be of wood four inches in diameter, but was not executed. A year later, in 1902, a bill was introduced into the legislature authorizing a pipe line from Oil Creek to Kittanning, Pa. (the state in which oil was first discovered), but it got no further, through the opposition of 4,000 teamsters. In fact, for some years the teamsters made impossible the success of the pipe line. They were doing very well out of the existing methods of transportation, earning \$10 to \$20 a day, and they viewed with vindictive disfavor the loss of dollars and weekly recreation. Both in 1903 and in 1905 the teamsters wrought havoc on the two pipe lines constructed in those years. Eventually progress gained the day, and many lines were laid, including one 102 miles long in 1909. It was not, however, till John D. Rockefeller and his associates took the matter in hand, eliminating all the old-fashioned methods of production and transportation, that petroleum began to be the power and profit it is today. In 1900 the United States produced 21,000,000 gallons. In 1917 it had risen to 18,440,000,000 gallons. Gasoline is still the chief derivative, but fuel oil has a great future.
