The Ellison-White Chatauqua have engaged him to tour with them giving this same lecture throughout Canada. His full page article on the Malay Peninsula in the Sunday Journal, besides his two long articles in the last two Sunday Oregonians, may be remembered.

The Oregon Audubon Society says of him: "He takes his audience with him to see the interior of this wonderful tropical country, illustrating his lecture with a series of stereopticon slides made from his own photographs. He shows pictures of wild elephants caught and tamed, wild monkeys caught and taught to gather food for the explorer from coconut palms; and the wild animals, birds and reptiles and jungle men, women and children, together with pictures of the Malays."

Altogether it is a most entertaining, instructive and educational lecture, drawing and holding the largest audience that the Audubon Society has ever had." Mrs. Wells will also appear and will dress up in Malay costume.

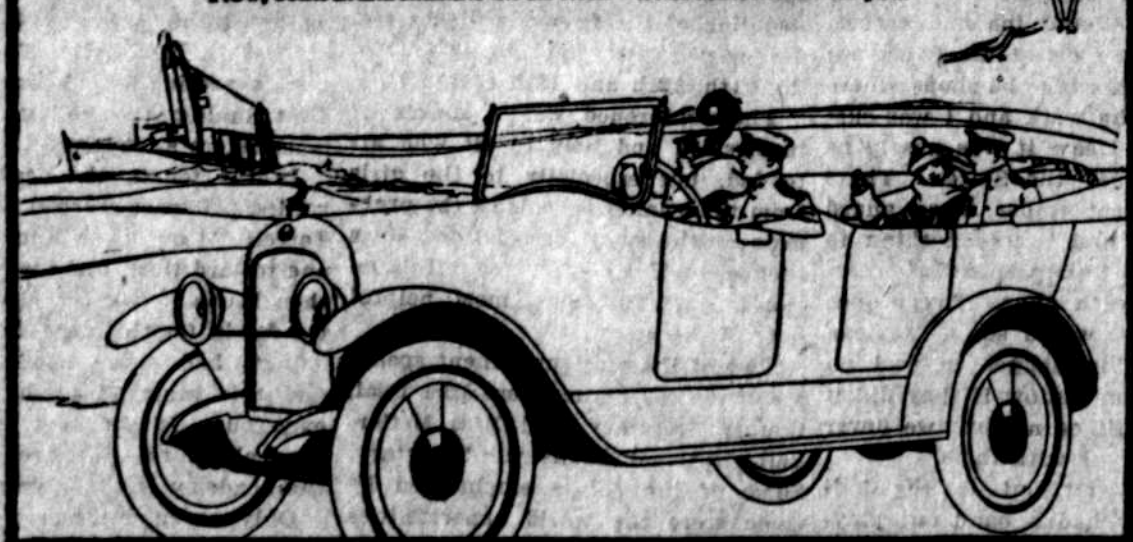
