OREGON VICTORY LOAN

A Victory loan advertising blanket will be spread over all Oregon. W. S. Kirkpatrick, Manager of the Advertising Bureau, has received information that J. L. Etheridge, President of Morris Brothers, Inc., Portland, in aid of the Victory loan has contributed to the advertising fund sufficient for one of the most distinctive paid publicity efforts ever made in any state in aid of the government. It will be launched just preceding the drive in Oregon. Every daily and weekly newspaper in Oregon will receive for simultaneous publication an advertisement almost a full page in size. This will mean 150 advertisements, 100 column inches each, or 15,000 inches of advertising at a cost of \$5,000. It is Mr. Etheridge's idea to make this appeal not only from a patriotic standpoint, but for the purpose of acquainting Oregon people with the true worth of a Government bond as a safe, sane and profitable investment. The publication date selected is April 17th.

The contribution is expected to serve not alone in carrying Oregon "over the top" but as a stimulus to the advertising fund campaign in each community of the state.

A WORTH WHILE OUTCOME OF WAR

Before the war the only way a South American could travel to New York in real comfort was to take a German, British or French steamer to Europe, and then re-ship to this country. We had no passenger ships worthy the name, and our service to the southern republics was miserable.

But we have waked up to the importance of direct and frequent communication between ourselves and the South Atlantic. We have finally taken cognizance of the fact that a straight line, even on the water, is the shortest distance between two points. So it will not be long before great ships, possessing splendid passenger as well as freight accommodations, will be leaving New York and heading south without giving Europe a chance to look in on the business.

There are now building in this country 22 12,000-ton ships which will give our South American neighbors the best that can be had in travel accommodations. Each stateroom will have two beds instead of berths, and a separate bath, an innovation in ocean travel. We may expect from this service an increase in that friendly and commercial intercourse for which we long have hoped, but after which we never before have gone with anything like Yankee energy. —Cincinnati Times-Star.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Cook cranberries with the cheaper cuts of boiled meat to make it tender and delicious.

Whenever you have scraps of pastry dough left over, make them into little cases for tarts.

Bread taken from the oven should not be wrapped in cloths. It spoils the flavor of the bread.

Mix bluing with hot water before adding it to the rinsing water and the clothes will not streak.

When watering house plants, if the water runs in the saucer it is a good sign, if not, something is wrong with the plant.

When making a silklike comfortable, buy an extra yard of material. Hem raw edges, and use to cover quilt when folded and placed at the foot of the bed day times.

When the whole heel of a stocking is gone take another old stocking and cut a piece off. Sew this over the hole and around it. It will stay much longer than if you darned it.

Either mashed or scalloped potatoes are nice with hot boiled ham. Also serve spinach and apple sauce. Potato salad made with bacon fat and served hot is a delicious accompaniment to hot boiled ham.

Before cleaning clothes in gasoline, mark each spot with a bit of light thread. Many of the smaller

spots will vanish after the garment has been soaked in gasoline, and the light thread will save time and labor in locating the spots that may need extra rubbing.

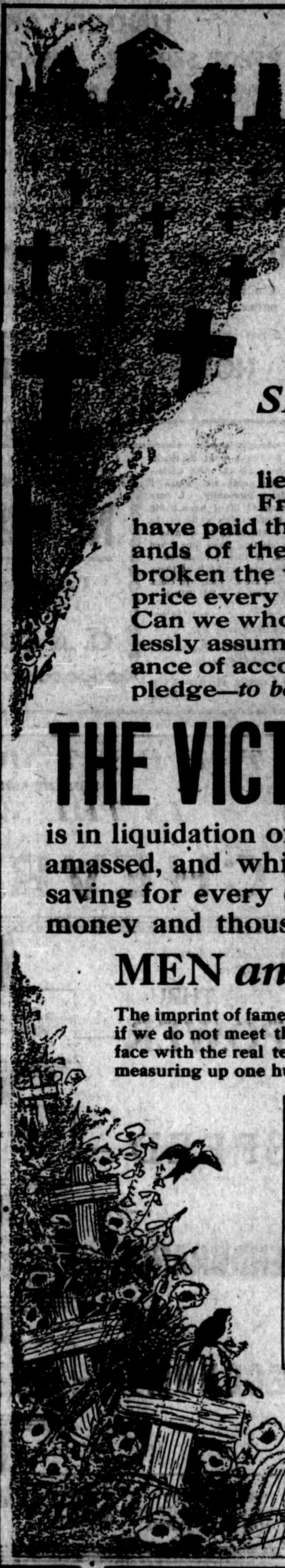
