were in all over 800 people out to see the game, mostly all Mexicans. The base ball team was made up of Mexicans that worked in the car shops. I was surprised to see the way they played. The game was the most interesting we ever had. At times the whole crowd would go nearly wild over some play. Some of the white people told us to be careful so that we wouldn't get them too mad at us for they couldn't stand much kidding, especially if they were behind. We were ahead of them for a long time but we had one bad inning and they got ahead

and kept it, ending 4 to 3 in their favor, and believe me, they sure were a happy lot.

Our next stop was at Rosalia, a mining town where there were eleven German interned ships. Stayed there for only a day, then went to La Paz.

At La Paz they do a lot of pearl diving and there were always some of the Mexicans coming alongside of the ship wanting to sell pearls as well as bananas, oranges and Mexican candies. The oranges were the best I ever tasted and we could get them for 20 cents a dozen. I didn't like the candy so well as I do some of ours but it wasn't so bad after all.

After we had been back to Pichilique a week the Collier Brutus came in and we knew we all had a lot of mail on board. We waited until ten o'clock at night until it was all distributed for we were all anxious to hear how things are going along at home and hear what is going on in this world of ours. Believe me, I know how the boys who are over in France feel when they don't hear a word from any of their friends at home. I sympathize with them for I have experienced it two or three times since I have been in the Navy.

First we read all our letters in a big hurry, then look the papers over, and once in awhile if we are lucky enough to get a box from home, we open it, and then we start all over again. Mother always sends me the Newberg Graphic and the first thing I always look for is the Dundee items. I am sure the other boys that haven't got back yet are as anxious to see them as I am, as well as all the rest of the news.

We stayed at Pichilique another week and on St. Patrick's day got orders to pull back to San Diego. We were only an hour in getting ready and in three hours some of the boys were feeding the fishes but a happy lot just the same.

We are getting ready to pull out for Seattle where our ship will go out of commission, and then for our discharges and back HOME again, which sure sounds good to all of us, and when we can sit around Mother's table and eat our heart's content, and forget all about reveille and the bugler's call every morning at 5:30 which goes:

"I can't get 'em up,
I can't get 'em up,
I can't get 'em up
In the morning," etc.
