"But one won't take it."

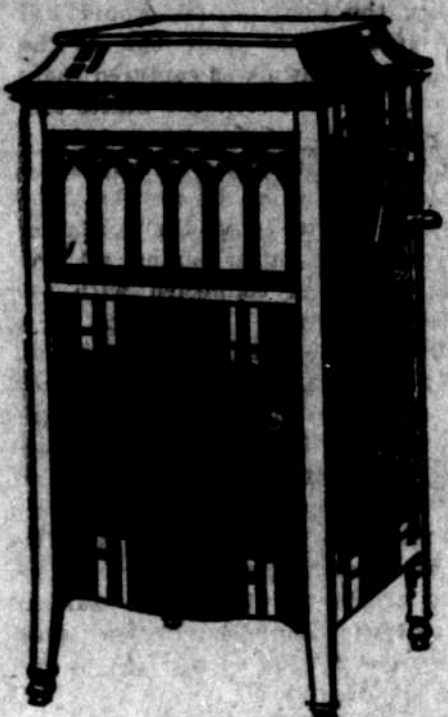
"Couldn't you put on a two and a one?"
