Robert S. Coleman, the negro who was arrested last week and his seven-passenger Studebaker load of fire water taken in tow, was arraigned before Justice J. O. Rogers in McMinnville, Attorney Edward L. Fraley, of Portland, appearing for him. He pled guilty and his sentence was a fine of \$400 and 30 days in jail. An appeal was taken to the Circuit Court and he was released on a cash bond of \$500 which he and the attorney were able to put up. Coleman, who is said to be a Pullman porter whose run is on the Southern Pacific, south, claimed he got the booze in Salem.
