Helgoland. Helgoland lies in the North sea, 40 miles northwest from the mouth of the Elbe. It consists of a steep, rocky plateau, 184 feet high, with a strip of firm sand at its southeasterly foot. Its area is about 123 acres. Kaiser William is said to have expended \$50,000,000 on the practical reconstruction of the island; it is fortified against sea and cannon alike with great granite buttresses 16 feet thick and 240 feet high on all sides. Even the fissures in its cliffs have been filled up and bound together with ferro-concrete—thousands of tons of it. The little island is wholly incased with a cemented belt of armor, fortified with modern ordnance.
