SON OF HENRY SCHUETTE LOSES LIFE IN PORTLAND

On last Monday morning a message came to Henry Schuette, who lives out north of Newberg, telling of the death of his son, W. C. Schuette, which occurred in Portland at 9 o'clock in an elevator accident in the Ainsworth building at Third and Oak streets.

He was employed by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. and went to the basement to read the meter. The Portland Telegram in telling of the casualty said:

Mrs. Lillian McGinnis, aged 22, of 390 Russell street, elevator operator, had taken the man to the basement and was waiting for him when someone rang for the car. She started up and Schuette made a jump for the car just as Mrs. McGinnis started up. He slipped and his head was caught between the floor of the car and the floor beams above, being badly crushed. Death was instantaneous.

Mrs. McGinnis fainted as she low-

ered the elevator and the body fell to the basement floor.

Schuette, who was known as "Bud," was formerly a conductor on the street car lines and for years ran on the Twenty-third street car. He was formerly a resident of Corvallis. He was a member of Prospect camp, Woodmen of the World.
