### THE GOSPEL TENT

My dear Mr. Editor—An article was published in the last issue of your paper in which a certain Geo. H. Lee scores the teaching in the tent, and scores the teacher. I understand this man is the Presbyterian minister in Newberg. He seems surely to be ruffled somewhat from the manner in which he writes. He talks about the "inaccurate Bible exposition, and improper religious deductions," but he does not help your readers any by telling what is wrong with the teaching.

To cap his failure to do this, he also becomes very discourteous, and ungentlemanly, and unchristian, and untruthful in his remarks about "these preachers of Saturday-ism." People who live in a glass house should not throw stones. I wonder if Mr. Lee has forgotten when a certain denomination taught as a "peculiar doctrine of their sect" that men were born to be lost? They had to give up that blasphemous teaching. Seventh Day Adventists have not failed in a single teaching since the beginning of their work.

Again, Mr. Lee seems not to be in touch with his own denominational confession of faith, for it reads, "We believe that the law of God, revealed in the Ten Commandments, and more clearly disclosed in the words of Christ, is forever established in truth and equity, so that no human work shall abide except it be built on this foundation."

His quarrel, therefore, is with his own denomination and not with us, for the Seventh Day Sabbath which we teach and keep is one of the "Ten" that are "forever established in truth and equity." If Mr. Lee does not like this Sabbath Commandment—one of the "Ten"—he had better apply to his own denomination to have it changed to read to his liking. If Mr. Lee does not believe that the Seventh Day is the Sabbath, his quarrel is also with God, and not with us, for God says it is.

Again, perhaps Mr. Lee does not know that his own denomination teaches the following: "God instituted the Sabbath at the creation of man, setting apart the seventh day for that purpose, and imposed its observance as a universal and perpetual moral obligation upon the race." Also further, "The observance of the seventh day Sabbath did not cease till it was abolished after the empire (referring to the Roman empire) became Christian. If Mr. Lee applies for the information the writer will be willing to tell him where Presbyterianism teaches this. And Mr. Lee knows that when the Roman empire turned from paganism to Christianity, it was Roman Catholicism that it turned to, and that the Council of Laodicea (about A. D. 364) issued the decree abolishing the Sabbath of Jehovah.

Mr. Lee's untruthfulness, or ignorance, let us say, and be kind, is seen in his statement that Seventh Day Adventists "seldom make a reference" to the resurrection of Christ. He is not well informed. Seventh Day Adventists maintain and teach that the whole plan of redemption depended upon the Savior's coming forth from the grave victorious over death. And, they preach the doctrine of the resurrection so fully that they teach that every soul since the beginning of the world who has hoped in God, and eternal salvation awaits the wonderful experience of resurrection, made possible through Christ, for the realization of their hopes. Our friend Mr. Lee does not do that. In his statements as to what we do and teach he puts the writer in mind of Charles Dickens who came to America and stayed a few days in New York and then returned to

England and wrote a book on the manners and customs of the American people

And now as to his statements concerning Daniel 8 and 9. Mr. Lee is somewhat mixed up on this matter. He confounds this prophecy with the one of Daniel 7. Because that in Daniel 7 the fourth beast represents Rome, he says "the little horn on the third beast" of Daniel 8 "is not and cannot be the fourth empire, the Roman empire." If he will only study the prophecy he would not make any such statement. In Daniel 8 the time of the last year of Babylonian rule is reached, the year of her overthrow by Medo-Persia. So Babylon is not mentioned in this prophecy as in that of Daniel 7. In Daniel 8 the first beast is Media and Persia, see verse 20. The second beast is Grecia, see verse 21. And every student of history knows the "first king" was Alexander the Great. And they know that when he died, his four leading generals, Cassander, Lysimachus, Seleucus and Ptolemy, killed off Alexander's people, and took the kingdom, dividing it among themselves, one taking Macedon, another Thrace, another Syria, another Egypt. See verse 22.

Now out of one of these four divisions of the empire of Grecia came forth "a little horn," that "waxed exceeding great." This power was of a strange speech and of fierce countenance. In Deut. 28:49-57, Moses prophesied of this same power that it would do the same work as told in the prophecy of Daniel 8. Every Bible student knows this prophecy has reference to Rome. The Roman empire did come out of one of the four horns of Daniel 8. It arose and subdued the world.

And, Mr. Lee to the contrary notwithstanding, there is something to the exposition of the "two thousand and three hundred days." His contention on "the point of the "evenings and mornings" means nothing. God calls the evening and morning a day. See Gen. 1:5, 8, 13, 19, 23, 31. And his statement that "the year-day idea was not in the text at all" is only his idea and proves nothing.

His statement concerning Seventh Day Adventists "that everywhere they go they do more to unsettle the minds of the unwary than they ever do to bring men out of sin and darkness into the light of the risen Christ" is not only ungentlemanly and unchristian and unbecoming, but it is unequivocally a falsehood. Seventh Day Adventists have gone into all the world. They are operating mission stations in every country under heaven, and thousands on the top of thousands of souls for whom Christ died have been turned from heathenism to rejoice in God, and are looking for the glorious return of their Lord and are keeping the Bible Sabbath. Mr. Lee cannot say that of what he or his are doing. And in our own land, and all over Europe, and in every civilized nation in the world men and women are turning from sin and error and foolish tradition to God, and are obeying the Truth, and there is not a boy or girl among them anywhere who could not prove to Mr. Lee, if he will only believe the Bible, that he is wrong in his keeping of Sunday, the first day of the week, instead of the Bible Sabbath, the seventh day.

Mr. Lee's contention, as I said before, should be with his own denominational teaching, and he should have a care lest haply he be found fighting against God.

In closing I would refer Mr. Lee for light on the "two thousand and three hundred days" to Newton Bagster, Prideaux's Connection, Rev. Wm. Halesin "A New Analysis of Chronology and Geography," Rev. T. R. Birk's "First Elements of Sacred Prophecy," Mason in "Two Essays on Daniel's Prophecy Number of Two Thousand Three Hundred Days," Dr. Clarke on Daniel 9:25, and Barnes' "Notes on Daniel," etc.

### Now They Help Missionary.

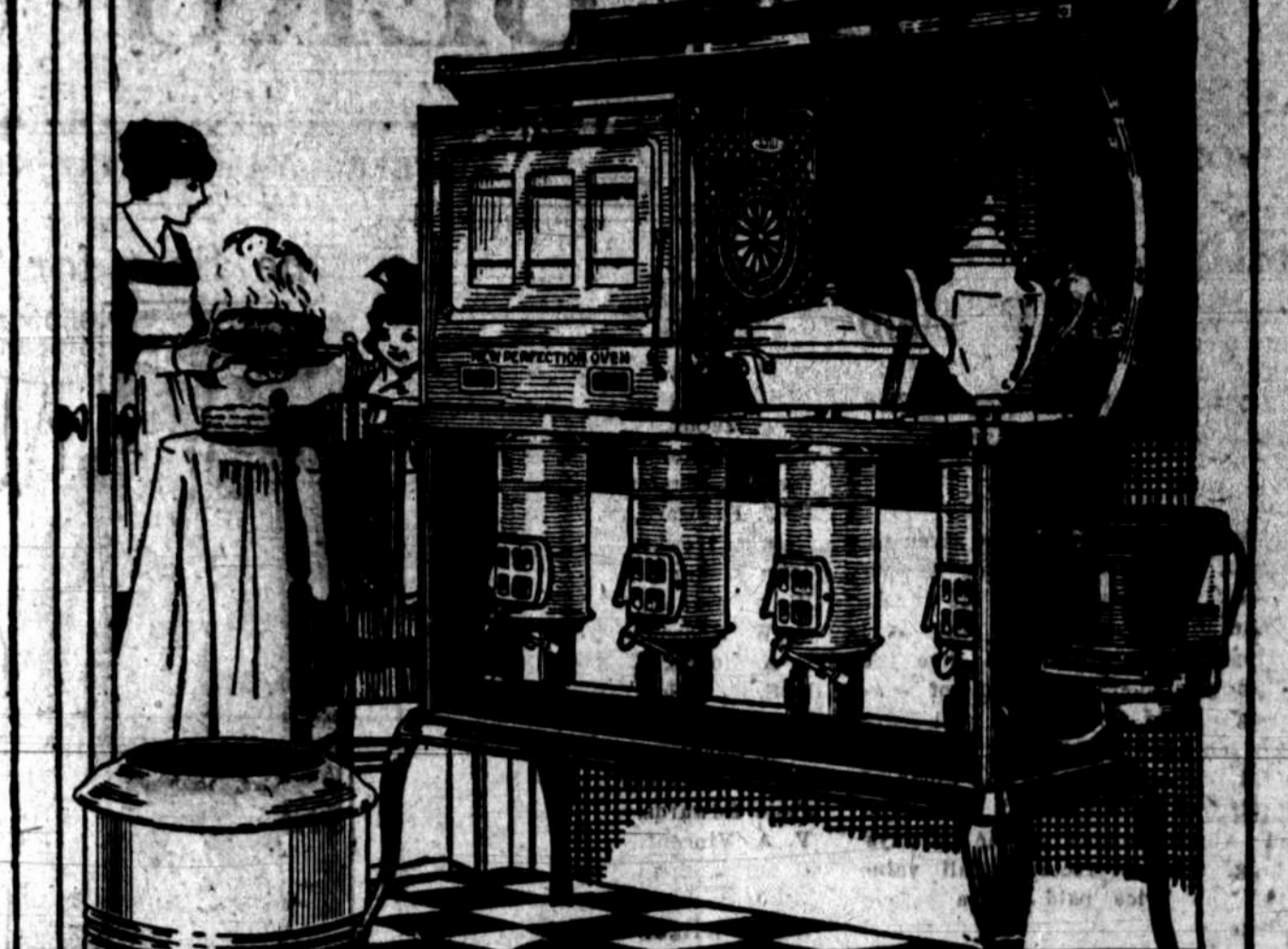

### DISEASE KILLS CANADA THISTLE

"Can science kill Canada thistle with artificially propagated disease germs?" This is the problem plant pathologists of the O. A. C. experiment station have set themselves to answer. Large areas of this weed pest have been found in Lane and Polk counties dead and dying apparently from an attack of a fungus disease that strikes the stalks a little way above and below the surface of the ground. Under this attack the plants wilt, die and shrivel up. Cultures of the fungus have been made for H. F. Barga of the station and when properly identified will be used to inoculate healthy thistles with a view to wholesale destruction. Farmers are asked to assist in these investigations by sending specimens of plants suffering from disease, should they be able to find any. Applications for cultures should not be made until their worth is tested.
