COURSE OF FARM ADVERTISING OFFERED

A short course on using the home newspaper to sell surplus farm produce will be offered farmers attending farmers' week at O. A. C. December 29 to January 3, by C. J. McIntosh, farmer, farm writer and ex-newspaper man.

"I have known farmers to pay a local commission man \$50 to sell 100 tons of alfalfa at \$20 a ton, when they could have sold it by paying the editor a dollar," said Mr. McIntosh in announcing the course. "They could have kept the extra \$49, credited it to the buyer or split it with him. I asked why not advertise and sell direct, and they said, 'Why, I never thought of it.'"

"Not only the advantage but the method of using the home paper will be considered. The success of the advertisement depends on the facts selected for announcement, the form in which they are stated, and the reputation of the advertiser. All of these—except the last—will be explained and so far as possible demonstrated."

Specimen advertisements that have been business-getters with results are wanted for this course.

Using the home press is not only profitable business but sound public policy as well, Mr. McIntosh asserts. These papers help farm production by running many a farm story that enables the farmer to increase or protect his crops, and are fairly entitled to a share of the paid news matter—advertising.

Editors generally like to run as news items farm stories of unusual yield, odd and interesting farm happenings and community enterprises, and the course will show how this matter may be handled to mutual advantage.

THE BIG HOME INDUSTRY

Small fruit production is the foundation of the biggest home and family industry in the west.

Growing small fruits gives the largest employment to family labor and still greater employment in manufacturing.

There are about one hundred canneries and fruit products plants on the Pacific coast, and as many more can be secured.

If 25,000 acres of small fruits are planted this fall and as many more next year, they will produce \$10,000,000 annually.

This will make room for another hundred plants and give employment to ten thousand additional hands the following year.

The cannery, fruit juice plant, jam and jelly factory and dehydrating plants employ home labor in field and factory.

Fair prices and increased production with hundreds of home industries employing home labor is better than shipping all our fruit away from home to be processed.

The home industry makes it possible to use all the by-products, and thousands of small producers assure the small fruit for the present industry and will bring in new industries.—Manufacturer.

TOMATO-APPLE MARMALADE

Six pounds of tomatoes, six of apples and nine of sugar are used with a 50 cent jar of preserved ginger to make tomato-apple marmalade, by O. A. C. cookery specialists. Cook the tomato soft and put through strainer. Cook the apples as for sauce. Boil tomatoes, apples and sugar to consistency of jam, adding ginger just before taking from fire. This will make 12 pints of delicious marmalade.
