LOGANBERRIES

The full commercial possibilities of the loganberry were not realized until it was used in the manufacture of fruit juice, jams and jellies. Its use in the last five years has gone from a point where it was a drug on the market to a point where supply cannot keep up with demands.

The ideal place for growing it is on river bottom and first bench land and it responds readily to irrigation. Vineyards 15 and 18 years old show no signs of running out and under favorable conditions the normal drop is from 4 to 7 tons to the acre. At prevailing market price of \$100 a ton loganberries are a wonderful money maker.

It is a crop that any person can afford to raise as it can be gone into in a small way and an acre field will make a grower an independent income.

The story of the loganberry and its entrance into world markets will soon be one of the industrial wonder tales of the Pacific Coast Manufacturer.

HIGH SCHOOL AGRICULTURE NEWS ITEMS

The class in animal husbandry visited the Newberg Creamery Company plant one day last week. It is probable that much practice may be had at this plant that cannot be given at the high school because of lack of equipment. A duplication of available equipment is not desired.

The class was impressed by this splendid opportunity to get good practical training in a commercial establishment so close to the school. The only regret was that the manager was not present, but assurance was given that he would doubtless be only too glad to co-operate.

Another visit was made by the plant husbandry class to a greenhouse range Monday morning of this week. This time it was Thos. E. Miles' place.

Mr. Miles was away but had previously given Mr. Kilham the privileges of his houses. Mrs. Miles met the class and again gave assurance that we were more than welcome.

One thing noted particularly was a solid bed about 66 feet long by 6 feet wide, filled with Grand Rapids lettuce. There is a very good opportunity for this "vegetable forcing" work in connection with truck farming. But, as was explained to the students, it requires capital just as it does in fruit growing, and a considerable amount of it right at the start, if one is to carry on such a business on fairly large scale.

An acre of ground covered by greenhouse glass in normal times means an investment of approximately \$20,000 (modern construction) and at present would no doubt represent an investment of half as much again. Still, it pays, and pays well, as the unceasing expansion of the greenhouse companies prove.

The fact was impressed upon the students, that the truck farmer or market gardener, with little or no capital at the start, doing business very often on rented land, may look forward to vegetable forcing as a natural expansion of his business.

Or, vegetable growing (trucking in particular) constitutes an opening wedge and a stepping stone into some other agricultural industry that cannot be surpassed.

Vegetable growing can be carried on, we believe, with a smaller initial outlay of money than any other agricultural vocation—but it means work, and plenty of it.
