POPULAR OWNERSHIP VS. GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP

Carl D. Jackson, chairman of the Wisconsin Railroad Commission, says:

"The actual ownership of most public utilities is by the people themselves. The first liens on most public utilities are very often owned by trust companies, banks, and largely by insurance companies throughout the United States. Nearly every man carries an insurance policy. The average citizen has a bank account, yet not one citizen out of a hundred realizes that in one form or another his actual savings and insurance and his wife's and children's welfare depend upon the solvency and continued operation of public utilities. There is probably not one man in fifty whom we meet on the street who does not own a part of a public utility, whether he knows it or not. So the question relating to public utilities is not confined to the consumers on one side and the public utilities as such on the other, but the whole question is one involving financially nine-tenths of the entire population. Furthermore, public utilities should not only be solvent in themselves, but there should still remain a reasonable incentive to reasonable development along the lines to be demanded by future generations. Nothing should take place in this country to discourage individual and collective efforts along progressive lines."
