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PRICE TIDE CHECKED

Both in Congress and in the daily press the clamor about the high cost of living has diminished until it is barely audible. The reason for this sudden decline in the agitation is to be found in the fact that retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers in many lines are barely able to supply the demand. The high cost of living is still pinching certain strata of the population, but the unprecedented consumption of necessities, comforts and luxuries, the speed with which they move from the shelves, indicate that the mass of Americans is able to purchase more of this world's goods than ever before, excessive prices notwithstanding.

The agitation accomplished all that could be expected of it. It checked the tide of speculation, scared the worst of the profiteers, held prices stationary and caused minor concessions here and there. From now on prices are bound to stay where they are or go down unless wage demands further increase the cost of production, transportation and distribution. If wages remain stationary, the inevitable decline of exports, due to European inability to pay, will force the export speculators to cut prices at home, in order to get rid of the goods which European inability to purchase left on their hands.—Editorial in November Sunset.

AGAINST THE MILITARY

The Allies may themselves ratify this treaty without us and thus assemble a Council of Nations of their own in an endeavor to solve the problem of Europe. It would be a Council of Europe, and in the midst of these terrible times, with the debts they owe us, the material they must have from us or starve, I would rather be represented therein lest it become a League of Europe against the Western Hemisphere. It is still more untrue to say that the newly liberated peoples look to us with other than conviction that our moral leadership is their only hope. We are not loved by any military class, whether in the allied or enemy countries. Our whole object has been to destroy their calling, to undermine their class. The great masses of burdened working people, however, look to us to support this one hope of relief from domination, from burdens and misery of arms and war.

Neither the gospel of hate nor the gospel of unpreparedness is the road to peace. The true road lies in every effort to remove the causes of war, not in tearing down such structures of peace as we may have, nor in blindness to present dangers.—Herbert Hoover in November Sunset.

FOREST SERVICE ISSUES GUIDE TO CRATER NATIONAL FOREST

"Recreation in the Southern Cascades" is the title of a folder just issued by the Forest Service.

One side of the folder contains a map, 15 by 24 inches, showing the recreation features of the Crater National Forest, in Southern Oregon. The map includes considerable of the surrounding country. It shows the roads and trails giving access to the Forest from Medford, Ashland and Klamath Falls, and calls attention to the public camp grounds and summer home sites maintained by the Forest Service at Lake of the Woods, Dead Indian Soda Springs, Recreation, Union Creek, Odessa, Natural Bridge, Blue Mountain, and other places. Points along the routes where tourists may find stores, meals, lodging, service stations, garages, and horse feed are indicated, and the location of Huckleberry Mountain Camp Ground is also shown. The map includes a mileage table giving the distance from Medford, Klamath Falls and Ashland to the principal recreation points.

The back of the folder carries a brief description of the Crater National Forest, and calls attention to its more important recreation features. Importance of care with fire is emphasized, and five rules for preventing fire are given:

"Forty thousand people visit Crater National Forest for varying periods each year, and there is room for thousands more. The visitor is not trammelled by rules or regulations. He may go where he likes, pitch his tent, help himself to wood for his fire and forage for his horse, and enjoy himself in his own way. All that is expected is that he will be careful with fire and in other ways see to it that he does not injure the beauty and usefulness of the forest. For the benefit of the visitor the Forest Service has provided many conveniences, especially at the most frequented camp sites, has built roads and trails and placed guide signs, surveyed summer home sites, and in many other ways made it easy to travel and vacation in the Forest."

The following quotation from the folder is worthy of repetition: "Take care of your forests as you do your own home. Do your share in keeping them attractive for other people. Damage to the forests means loss to everyone in many different ways. Be careful with fire. Keep the stream pure. Keep the camp clean. This folder tells you about many of the recreational features of the Southern Cascades. The map will guide you to them and to the enjoyment of many leisure hours."

HUMANE SOCIETY GETTING BUSY

The Oregon Live Stock Association took a rap at some of the skingames allowed by the concessions committee of the State Fair Board, and also upheld by resolution the work of the State Humane Society in having three officers at the Roundup, two of whom were there two days before, witnessing the try-outs in corrals, to see that there was no unnecessary cruelty practiced on animals. The reports made to the State Humane Society show several instances of cruel and inhuman treatment of animals, and recommend cutting out these features from future exhibitions of this character in the state. The Live Stock Association backs up the Humane Society in its investigations.
