The boys stuck close to the classroom and laboratory last week.

Tops have been made for the manual training tables. Soil has already been placed in two. In so far as acquiring skill in manipulative technique is concerned, we are nearly ready to proceed.

Flats have been made of two styles—one 12x18x2 1/4 inches with tight bottom and one 14x20x1 1/4 inches with narrow cracks in bottom for drainage.

Each boy has made one of each style to date. The smaller is for cutting propagation, the larger for seed bed and general plant work.

The Department solicits contribu-

tions of plant materials of various kinds from the people of Newberg and vicinity.

Cuttings from house plants, etc., a small part of your canna, dahlia, or gladiolus increase. Pieces of your herbaceous perennial clumps when you are dividing and re-planting. Seeds of various kinds.

These will all be gladly received and will be used at the high school for education and landscape improvement purposes.

Mr. Kilham has given some very excellent herbaceous perennial seed as a starter. Mr. Gower has offered to give at least one specimen of his collection of this same type of plant. Certain commercial nurseries have made known their willingness to contribute once the fall shipping season is over.

Also, we have recently received one donation from a kind Newberg lady.

Who will be the next? You need not be backward. We have plenty of laboratory room, and an acre of ground outside. Who'll be the next?

THE DAY OF READJUSTMENT DREADED

Many people believe it best to accept present inflated prices and conditions, rather than to attempt a readjustment downward, on the ground that prices and wages are now both adjusted to a high level. They know labor will fight any effort to restore former conditions as to wages, and many people dread the bitter controversies that will ensue. But if the present inflated values are accepted as permanent, it will mean that all savings of the past in the form of bank deposits, life insurance policies, bonds, mortgages, stocks, and similar securities will all lose approximately one-half their value in purchasing power, for a dollar saved before the war and invested in any of the forms mentioned will now buy but half as much as then. Hence it is absolutely essential to social justice and progress that the present high level of values and prices be at least partially readjusted.—Aurora Observer.
