In these days when one reads of the difficulty in large cities of obtaining the expected quota in membership to the Red Cross, it is gratifying to be able to report that several well known Red Cross workers in the Dundee district were asked by many persons, both in person and over the phone, "Why have the Red Cross solicitors not visited us?" Instructions were late in coming to the district chairman of the drive but when they did arrive, the whole community was enrolled in practically one day, very few in this one hundred percent district refusing to renew their membership, all of which goes to show that in this locality the need of the work of the Red Cross is recognized in re-construction and peace times as well as in that of war. Again we are proud of Dundee.

Prof. J. P. Powell will open a free class in his new method of singing music at sight. "A break from the conventional method of teaching to sing at sight," in the Dundee Library on Saturday afternoon. All ladies of the community who are desirous of learning to sing at sight are invited to join the class. Mr. Powell's method has recently been printed, and the copies received are meeting with favorable comment by those who have seen them and who appreciate the advantages of his method, especially as regards the saving of time and effort in learning to read music and sing at sight. In Mr. Powell's Foreword he says, "From this series of cards and booklets, termed First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Readers, every topic that does not belong to sight singing has been eliminated, leaving nothing to be learned but the three essential requisites, music characters, time and tonality. Theory of music, musical form, harmony, counterpoint and vocal culture are classed as private studies, and, however important as a musical finish, will have to be considered non-essential in teaching to sing at sight. Vocal culture is not a branch of music. It is art applied to music—a topic which cannot be properly considered till mutation of the voice has fully taken place. Dismissing non-essentials from class drill reduces sight singing to a common branch of study, which branch, by an orderly use of the Readers, can be completed by children of normal minds by the end of the first five years of school life."

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Coffee gelatin and junket broken and served with cream in the same individual dishes makes a pleasing dessert.

To bleach handkerchiefs, towels, etc., soak over night in a solution of half a teaspoon of cream of tartar to each quart of water.

Blotting paper bought in large sheets and cut to fit bureau and dresser tops makes an excellent protection to the wood from spots. Select a color that corresponds to the room and put it under the scarf. The effect is very pleasing.

To keep sandwiches fresh, wring out a napkin in hot water, wrap them in it and put in a cool place. Allow at least three Turkish towels for each member of the family when planning towel supplies.

A teaspoon of sugar to a pint of mashed turnip will do much to remove the bitter taste, which often about ruins the turnip.

Sick headache can often be helped and even cured by a cup of strong black coffee without sugar. If the juice of half a lemon has been added.

When the dough of cookies is too rich or too soft to roll, take a small portion in the palm of the hand and roll in a ball. Place this in a baking pan and when the pan is filled, flour the bottom of a glass and press each ball to the desired thickness.
