Former Knights and Ladies of Security Hold Grand Campaign for New Members

NEWBERG Council No 168 is waging a campaign for 100 new members to close the year 1919. Fifty applications have been received of which 19 have been initiated. A class of 12 were initiated on last Friday evening, in the I. O. O. F. Hall. The State Manager, Mr. L. M. Thomas, and wife, from Portland, were present and assisted in the initiatory ceremony. Owing to the severe cold and stormy weather many of the promised candidates failed to be present, but the

seriousness of the weather did not prevent a full attendance and a large class for initiation. At the close of the meeting refreshments were served in the banquet hall, presided over by Sister Brooks and her able assistants. Mr. L. M. Buel, of Kirkpatrick Council 2227, of Portland, recently moved to Newberg where himself and family will make their future home, has been appointed as Local Deputy, assisted by the President,

Brother Cates, and the Booster Committee are meeting with excellent success. If present prospects do not miscarry the 100 mark will be doubled by the closing meeting night of the year which has been set for December 27th. Newberg Council is the oldest Council in Oregon, but for several years has not held regular meetings until a year ago when Brother and Sister Mackie spent some time adding new members, when a class of 19 were initiated. This short campaign stimulated the membership for a greater Council, when the State Manager was appealed to for a second campaign which is now being carried on with renewed interest by the membership. Newberg Council was organized October 14, 1894, with 15 Charter Members, the first President being Joel Gee; Secretary, J.

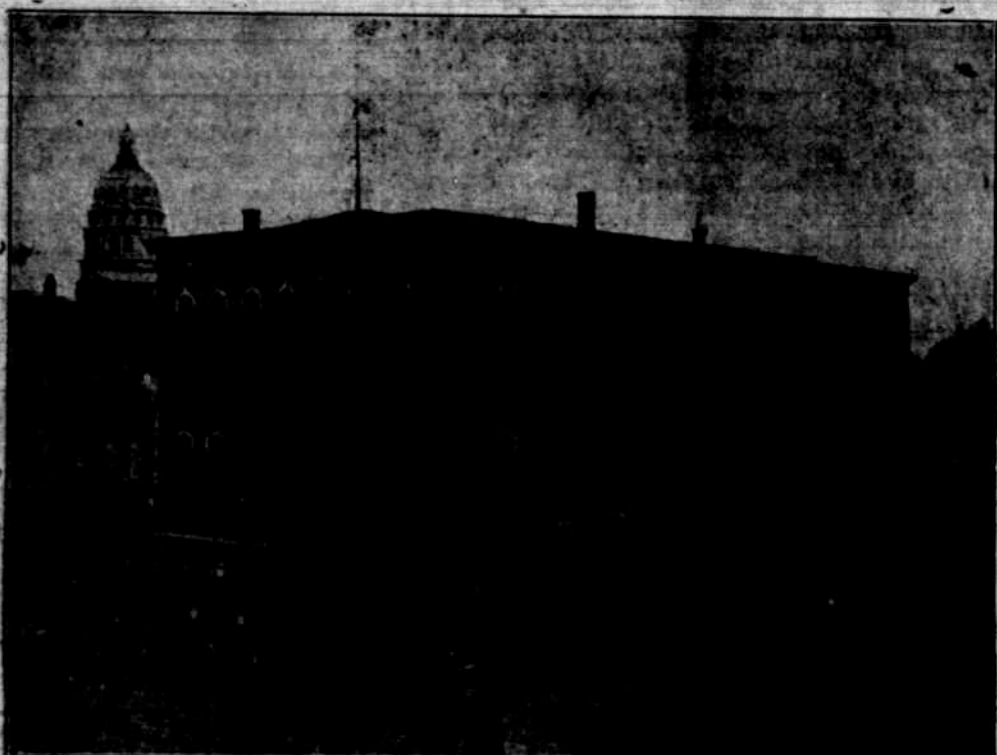


L. M. THOMAS—State Manager

K. Wright; Financier, C. F. Butler—Brother Butler holding the office of Financier until the last election of officers when he asked to be relieved of the office, and was elected President to fill the unexpired term. Brother W. B. Brooks was elected as his successor. Over \$12,000 has been paid to beneficiaries as death benefits by Newberg Council. A Mrs. Mary Allen is now receiving old age benefits, one-tenth of her certificate each year. The Association now has over 3,500 local Councils with a membership exceeding 225,000 with six Councils and nearly 4,000 members in Portland. The Society admits men and women on same terms and maintains a home and hospital near Topeka, Kansas, headquarters of the Order, including a large farm of 375 acres, where orphan children of deceased members are given a home and education without expense to anyone, a fund being provided by an amount being set apart from the general funds of the Order for the maintenance of the home and hospital. Provisions are also made for the care of aged members who may not have convenient homes and desire to avail themselves of the advantages of the conveniences of the home and hospital in their declining years.

Since the opening of the home and hospital one year ago, over 100 orphan children and aged members have been admitted to its shelter. Each year as necessity demands, new units will be added to the building, as it is the policy of the management that no worthy orphan or aged member shall be deprived of the benefits provided by the home.
