as Editor

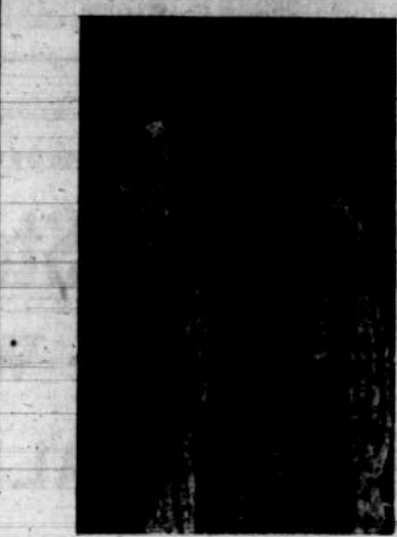
E. H. Woodward, of the Newberg Graphic celebrated New Year's day by rounding out 30 years as editor and publisher of that typical, live country weekly. In that time he has seen the paper grow from 14 columns to 48 and often more and from a Washington hand press equipped to modern cylinder presses and linotype. He has announced the birth of all the babies in the vicinity and married off all the good looking ones. The files of the Graphic for the past thirty years represent a most complete history of the entire community and all compiled and published under the supervision of one man. We congratulate Mr. Woodward on the good town he has helped build up and we congratulate Newberg on being a good enough town to retain Mr. Woodward all these years. The Graphic is one of the town's unquestioned assets. Long may it wave.—Corvallis Gazette.

With the issue of January 1, 1920, the Newberg Graphic, of Newberg, rounded out thirty years of its existence under the ownership and management of its present editor. The paper was started December 1, 1888, and was taken over by Mr. Woodward thirteen months later. Mr. Woodward is the dean of the newspaper field in Yamhill county, having served for the longest consecutive period. We think there is perhaps one or two men in the newspaper field of the county slightly older than he is. He is a man the editor of this paper has always regarded much in the light of a brother. We have found him a true friend and we think so much of him that we take the opportunity to congratulate him on his long service and the high respect he enjoys among a wide circle of friends in his particular field. A man must be a good man to hold a newspaper field thirty years and retain his circle of friends. Such a life means much to the man who lives it and to the community in which he lives.—Telephone-Register.

The Newberg Graphic last week completed its 30th year under the present management, during which time Editor Woodward has been one of the controlling interests that has caused the expansion of Newberg from a country hamlet to a city of nearly three thousand people and has seen the Graphic always keeping step in the forefront of the procession of progress. Thirty years is a long time in the life of any person, and especially does it seem long in the continual grind of a newspaper man when his pathway is beset with thorns that persistently obstruct his way. But Mr. Woodward has surmounted all difficulties and has the supreme satisfaction of knowing that the Graphic is appreciated and its influence in the community and the state at large continue undiminished. Twelve years ago the first of January the writer arrived in Sheridan, and twelve years ago today he produced the first issue of The Sun under his management, and although the period of his work in the county has been but slightly more than one-third of the span of the Graphic editor it is next to him in point of recent continuous service. Other papers in the county have at times changed editors, and sometimes the changes have been for the better, but as a whole the continuous services of the present publishers of the county have been longer than the usual average of country publishers. Twelve years ago George Martin was the publisher of the Telephone-Register and C. Hammerly was at the head of the News-Reporter. Mr. Martin is still with the former in a different capacity. John G. Eckman is now the editor and was a former newspaper publisher before he was postmaster. The Amity Standard and the Willamina Times were not then published. The Carlton Sentinel and the Yamhill Record were both in existence, as was also the Dayton Tribune but under a different name, and the names of the editors are

not now recalled. LaFayette supported a paper for a while and twice during this time Newberg had the second paper but in both cases gave way to the Graphic. Of the nine local newspapers now published in the county everyone is well filling its sphere of usefulness and all are persistent supporters of their respective communities. At this time they are laboring under a heavy handicap owing to still unsettled conditions but none know the word "fail" in their vocabulary and as long as their enthusiasm and determination continue so long will their subscribers receive the very best that is in them.—Sheridan Sun.

E. E. BODIE NOT A CANDIDATE
FOR SECRETARY OF STATE

Oregon City, Oregon, January 10.—Special—E. E. Bodie, publisher of the Morning Enterprise, announced Saturday that he would not be a candidate for the Republican nomination for Secretary of State at the primary election next May.

"My many friends among the newspaper editors of the state," said Mr. Bodie today, "were the first to propose my name in connection with the office of Secretary of State, and I have already received, without solicitation, the endorsement and promised support of more than 20 papers throughout the state."

"This, of course, is extremely gratifying and flattering, and I am deeply appreciative of the kind things that have been said about me. This is the first time that I have been even a prospective candidate for public office, though I have been honored by election and appointment to non-salaried positions in the state, and have for four years been chairman of the Republican county central committee for Clackamas county, which gave a plurality of 1,015 to the Republican nominee for President four years ago, and a clear majority for Mr. Hughes of 227 over all other candidates for president."

"After long reflection, I cannot separate myself from a profession with which I have been connected since boyhood. The publishing of a newspaper, in my opinion, is of greater dignity and service than holding a public office. The true newspaper man may be tempted by visions of easier tasks and shorter hours, but if he is true to the calling of his own choosing, he will stick and resist the temptation to forsake a legitimate business wherein he should be a leader in influencing public opinion within the radius of his newspaper's circulation."

"The Enterprise was established 54 years ago, and has been published continuously in Oregon City since 1866. Only two newspapers in Oregon are older. My connection with The Enterprise covers 15 years, the last 12 years as publisher. We have just purchased and remodeled a building and have the finest newspaper home in the state, outside of Portland. The Morning Enterprise is healthy, its growth and progress have been marked and I expect to continue as its publisher and do my part in making Oregon a better state to live in for many years to come."

FOR EX-SERVICE MEN

The National War Work Council of the Young Men's Christian Association has placed at the disposal of the Interstate Committee of Oregon and Idaho a limited sum of money to be used for educational work for ex-service men. This is a part of a national program providing free scholarships in Y. M. C. A. and other accredited schools; a limited fund for college and university scholarships; also a plan of home study courses on a broad range of practical and vocational subjects; lecture bureau service and Americanization work for non-English speaking people. The allotment of funds has been made by counties according to population.

Definite county and district committees are being formed and will soon be working. In the meantime, all interested ex-service men may apply for information to the local association at any of the following cities: Astoria, Baker, Bend, Corvallis, (O. A. C. Association) Eugene, LaGrande, Marshfield, Pendleton, (Co. Association) Portland, Salem, Oregon; Boise, Kellogg, Moscow, (U. of Idaho Association) Payette, Pocatello, Rose Lake, Idaho, or address the Interstate Educational Secretary, Room 605 Y. M. C. A. Building, Portland, Oregon.

The Y. M. C. A. schools co-operate with the state of Oregon in providing financial assistance for ex-service men while they are in school.

MRS. EMMA BELL CHRISTENSON DIES AT CORVALLIS

On Saturday of last week, Mrs. Emma Bell Christenson died at her home in Corvallis, her age being nearly 69 years.

The maiden name of the deceased was Rachel Emma Taylor and she was born in Scott county, Indiana, April 9, 1851. She was married in March, 1867, to John D. Bell, at Hamilton, Illinois. In June, 1874, they moved to Oregon and some thirty years ago they located in Newberg, the husband dying here in 1895. On December 26, 1913, Mrs. Bell was married to C. H. Christenson, who survives her. Her last illness was caused by cancer of the breast, which was relieved by a surgical operation last September. Although brave and hopeful, she suffered intensely for over three months and being resigned her death was beautiful. On Friday evening she called the family, each one individually, and told them good-bye, then peacefully waited until the end came.

Besides the husband the deceased leaves an only sister, Mrs. Mary E. Bankson, who was with her through her affliction, administering with loving care to all her wants, and four children by her first husband, namely, Mrs. Flora Bell Beaumont, Robert G. Bell, Mrs. Vesta Hollingsworth and Mrs. Ruth E. Phillips, and a number of grandchildren.

For about thirty years the deceased was a resident of Newberg and she was held in good esteem by a large circle of neighbors and friends. She was a pillar in the Baptist church wherever she was located; always alert to the interest of the work. Her first husband was a charter member of the Shiloh Post G. A. R. and she held the same position with the local W. R. C.

Funeral services were held here at the Baptist church on Sunday morning, being conducted by Rev. A. L. Black, of Portland, who was the pastor of the deceased here twenty years ago. Burial was made in the family lot at Pleasant Hill Cemetery.

One of the first measures to claim the attention of the house members was the ratification of national woman's suffrage which went through promptly by resolution. It was later passed on favorably by the senate and the signing of the same by the governor, with Mrs. Thompson hovering near, was properly staged by the newspaper photographers.

Many bills have been introduced, a large number of which will no doubt be lost in the shuffle, if the resolution for adjournment on Saturday, which has been adopted, is carried out.

The fish and game commission is receiving the largest share of attention and just what will come from the muddle nobody seems to know at this time.

The "third house" appears to be but poorly represented, though the Salem hotels are said to be well filled with guests.

RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the county of Yamhill, Oregon, to be held at McMinnville and Newberg on February 14, 1920, to fill the position of rural carrier at Carlton, and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above-mentioned county. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977.

This form and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.
