HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Grease spots may be removed from colored silk with chloroform. Drop the chloroform on spot and rub with a soft cloth.

To take out tar, rub well with fresh lard. Allow to remain for several hours, then wash with soap. A little salt or camphor put in lamps helps to give a better light. It also saves oil.

A cheap brown picture frame can be painted yellow and then gilded to look like an expensive frame.

In filling the lamp or the oil heater if it is found that too much oil has been poured in an excellent thing to remove the superfluous oil is a medicine dropper.

Take the garment that is to be cleaned and if there are spots on it run a thread around them so as to be able to find them easily after the garment is wet and the spots are not apparent.

To boil eggs that are cracked, wrap in a piece of white muslin and there will be no danger of oozing out in the water.

Use a gravy boat in filling jars with preserves. It is easily dipped into the hot kettle of fruit by means of the handle, and the long mouth fits into jars of any size and thus prevents spilling.

The common nut cracker makes a splendid little household wrench for cans and bottles with screw tops. Even the stubborn glass stopper will yield to the gentle pressure of this convenient little article.

If a piece of lemon is added to a pan of cold water and the wilted vegetables allowed to stand in the water for an hour or so they will be as fresh as when gathered. Especially good for lettuce, celery, spinach and parsley.

The best way of preventing a bed from becoming damp if left for a few weeks is to "make" it and then put a blanket all over the top. Take it off before using the bed, and you'll find it quite dry.

OYSTER RAISING IN HOLLAND

Highly Scientific Methods Employed in That Country Have Been Remarkably Successful.

In the industry represented by oyster cultivation, Holland is the most systematic in its operations and employs more elaborate methods than any other country in the world.

The numerous sounds that indent the coast of Holland, particularly in the region of the River Scheldt, afford excellent facilities for the propagation of the oyster and enable the country to conduct the most successful oyster industry in Europe.

Public dredging is not permitted, as the result of that system was the threatened exhaustion of the fisheries, and the beds have been carefully surveyed and specific tracts are leased to individuals and companies, who are thus enabled to conduct the propagation of the oyster in a systematic manner that insures the best results from the territory available.

Many growers lease several tracts in different localities, and adapted to different purposes, which facilitated the various operations, as the oysters can be shifted from one place to another, according to the season and the stage of development.

A few of the oystermen plant shells on the banks, as is done in many places in this country, but the largest and most successful propagators are equipped with their own tanks and ponds, located in convenient shallow bays, in which they carry on the culture.
