Wm. Parrett, one of the old settlers of the Parrett Mountain section, died on last Friday. Funeral services were conducted at the Christian church on Sunday morning by K. H. Sickafosse, the pastor. The deceased was born in Kent county, England, June 26, 1852, and six weeks later the family sailed for America, coming around by Cape Horn, requiring six months to make the trip. On their arrival in Oregon the family located on Parrett Mountain, six miles east of Newberg, which has since been the home of the deceased continuously, with the exception of a few years spent at Dundee. The surviving members of the family are the widow, whose maiden name was Elizabeth Ashpole, and five sons, namely, Charley, Archie, John, Fred and Donnie, and one daughter, Mrs. Harold Prince. Two sons died when small. There are also three brothers, John, James and Richard, and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Ann Higgins and Mrs. Catherine Rhoades.

SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE CLOSED

The Sunday school institute conducted at the Brethren church by Rev. Virgil C. Fennell, of Elgin, Illinois, closed Tuesday evening. It was a most interesting and enjoyable series of gatherings.

Monday at 10 o'clock and again at 1:30 there were meetings with Sunday school workers. In these meetings Mr. Fennell discussed Sunday school methods and answered questions regarding difficulties encountered by the workers.

Monday evening at 7:30 he gave an address on the Foreign Missionary activities of the Brethren church. This address was illustrated by stereopticon views of the places discussed.

Tuesday at 10 a. m. and again at 1:30 p. m. Mr. Fennell gave addresses on child psychology and offered many valuable suggestions as to the means of keeping children interested in Sunday school. These addresses were not only intensely interesting, but were extremely valuable to all interested in Sunday school work.

Tuesday at 7 p. m. there was a lecture on the effects of tobacco on the young. This lecture was well illustrated by the stereopticon. Following these views, at 8 p. m., Mr. Fennell gave an address on "The Biggest and Best Paying Business." He referred to the magnitude of the lumber industry, wheat growing, cotton raising, fruit culture, various lines of manufacture, and other big businesses, but showed conclusively that "The Biggest and Best Paying Business" is the training of boys and girls into Christian citizenship.

These addresses were so well received that at the close, the Sunday school superintendents present decided to ask Mr. Fennell to come again to Newberg. This he consented to do. He will visit us again next fall on his return from Japan where he goes to attend the World's Sunday School Association in September. He will reach Newberg about December 1st. His next visit will take the nature of a community affair and the meetings will be held in the most suitable place available.

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
