COUNTY TEACHERS' INSTITUTE ONE OF PROFIT

The first meeting of the Yamhill County Teachers' Association for 1920 was held recently in the Senior high school building in McMinnville. After an opening song led by Miss Esther Smith, of the McMinnville schools, City Superintendent George Hug addressed the teachers on the subject of "Recent School Legislation." He also discussed some of the proposed school legislation. His address was clear and concise, and the teachers received some very definite ideas as to "what's doing for the schools" in Oregon. He also explained the work of the State Teachers' Association in connection with school legislation, and those who heard him have a much clearer idea of the relations of that association to teachers and schools.

Miss Isabelle Bovee, physical director of the O. A. C., then occupied the remainder of the morning session in drilling the teachers in the work of physical instruction that is required by law in the schools of Oregon. She went over the course of study with teachers, illustrating by actual class work, exactly what we are required to do in the schools. The teachers were her willing and enthusiastic pupils.

The afternoon session was opened by several musical numbers by pupils of the McMinnville schools, directed by Miss Esther Smith. Their work was excellent, and it was well received by the teachers present.

The business session followed, and the following officers were elected for the current year: S. David Titus, president; Miss Veda Rhodes, secretary; Edgar R. Means, vice president. Heads of departments were elected as follows: Mrs. Laura Morris, primary; Miss Julia Huss, intermediate; Miss Laura Judy, advanced; F. H. Buchanan, industrial; M. S. Taylor, high school. The ru-

Wm. Parrett, one of the old settlers of the Parrett Mountain section, died on last Friday. Funeral services were conducted at the Christian church on Sunday morning by K. H. Sickafosse, the pastor. The deceased was born in Kent county, England, June 26, 1852, and six weeks later the family sailed for America, coming around by Cape Horn, requiring six months to make the trip. On their arrival in Oregon the family located on Parrett Mountain, six miles east of Newberg, which has since been the home of the deceased continuously, with the exception of a few years spent at Dundee. The surviving members of the family are the widow, whose maiden name was Elizabeth Ashpole, and five sons, namely, Charley, Archie, John, Fred and Donnie, and one daughter, Mrs. Harold Prince.

Two sons died when small. There are also three brothers, John, James and Richard, and two sisters, Mrs. Al department was left in the charge of the county school superintendent. An invitation to hold the next meeting in Amity on the last Saturday in February was unanimously accepted.

County Superintendent Allen, of Columbia county, then addressed the teachers on various matters of importance, and gave them advice that will result in better and more enthusiastic work in the school of every teacher that was privileged to hear him.

Miss Bovee then occupied the remainder of the day in exercises similar to those given in the morning, and a large share of the audience remained to take part in the physical drills until after 4 o'clock. We are certain that the work of Miss Bovee will be felt in every school represented in the institute, and that the teachers left the meeting with a very definite idea of the importance of the work.
