Order to Show Cause

In the County Court of Yamhill County, State of Oregon. In the matter of the Guardianship of the Estates of James Lloyd Sawyer and Paulmer Buttress Sawyer, non-resident Minors.

On this 10th day of Mar., 1920, comes S. L. Parrett, the guardian of the estates of James Lloyd Sawyer and Paulmer Buttress Sawyer, non-resident minors, and presents to this Court his petition, in due form, praying of this Court for an order thereof authorizing and licensing him, as such guardian, to sell, at private sale, for cash, in the manner provided by law, all of the real property belonging to said minors and located in Yamhill County, State of Oregon, and particularly described in said petition, which is on file in this Court; and it appearing to this Court, from said petition, that it would be beneficial to said minors and to their estates that their said real property should be so sold: It is, therefore, hereby ordered by this Court that the next of kin of said minor wards and all persons interested in their said estates and all persons interested in said real property appear before this Court at the usual place of holding this Court, at the court house in McMinnville, in Yamhill County, State of Oregon, on the 9th day of April, A. D. 1920, at the hour of ten o'clock a. m. of said day, and then and there show cause why an order of this Court should not be granted, as prayed for in said petition, authorizing and licensing said guardian to sell said real property of said minors in the manner above stated.

And it is hereby further ordered by this Court, that a copy of this order to show cause be published at least once a week for three successive weeks in the Newberg Graphic, a newspaper of general circulation, published weekly, at Newberg, in Yamhill County, Oregon, to give due notice of this proceeding.
