### HIGH SCHOOL AGRICULTURE NOTES

The Agriculture Department is trying to improve the high school grounds somewhat.

We need manure, and we need plants of different kinds.

People of this community were requested when the department was first organized, to donate some of their surplus stock. To date just two ladies have volunteered. Now is the time to let us know.

Phone either Red 86, or Red 221, please, and we will come promptly for the plants.

We ask you to kindly co-operate with us in this, for it is a shame not to have clean, neat appearing school grounds, and your help is needed looking toward improvement.

You are all generous—that is well known. Cease being indifferent—please!

As to pruning—

1. Watch your buds as you cut, and prune accordingly. You are to determine the direction of future terminal growth to attain your ideal, both as to form and flower or fruit bearing ability.

2. Most fruit trees after the second season require mainly a thinning out of superfluous growth from the tops, to make open enough to permit every fruit bud and growing fruit to receive maximum sunlight, with continued symmetry of form.

Farmer's Bulletin 181, "Pruning," is well worth sending for. A postal will bring it. U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

As to home fruit production—We all realize as consumers, that it is of little advantage to live in a specialized farming section—at least except perhaps during the actual harvest season.

Our grocers are shipping apples in to sell to us in an important fruit section.

No matter where you may go it is the same. Go where cabbage is grown by the thousand acres and go without kraut. The same with dill pickles; with pears; with grapes; and so on without end.

What is the answer?

Home production!

"More self-supporting homes," at least insofar as vegetables, fruits, flowers, poultry, and dairy products are concerned—and in some cases, meat also. All certainly can have somewhat of the first five.

A natural distaste for "killing" may prevent home meat production, making it a work more for the few perhaps, who can trade or sell to the many.

But we are off our subject. To return to it, suggest you send for Farmer's Bulletin 1001, "Growing Fruit for Home Use." It is new, it's a "dandy." It will please and help you.

As to strawberries—

We never have enough of this fruit, either for home use or canning.

According to figures of the Phez Co., a profit of \$335 may be made on one acre with a harvesting of 6,000 pounds the second year from planting.
